A Sense of History

Decades and centuries are arbitrary and meaningless measures of time when gauging effects on history. A cyclical rhythm created by nature, not by man, provides a better measure. Man observed this rhythm, found that it worked, and adopted it. Thus were born systems ranging from the twelve-year Chinese calendar to the four-generation pattern of idealist/reactive/civic/adaptive as explained by Ron Dzwonkowski in the Detroit Free Press in January 1999. Generations actually provide the most meaningful unit of historical perspective.

Unfortunately, my age group belongs to what may be the most noteworthy

generation in American history, for a most saturnine reason. Most parents hope that their children will have a better life than they had. We will be the first generation to have the cards stacked against us in that regard. We may be more likely to have a living standard lower than that of our parents, for the following reasons.

- * Gone are the days of working forty years for the same company and retiring with a lucrative pension. Most of us will retire with no pension at all. Many will never be able to truly retire.
- * Despite the trend toward healthier living (fewer smokers and drinkers, better diets), health care costs continue to spiral out of control. How much will an ambulance ride cost when we are 60, before Medicare takes effect?
- * Eventually, college might only be affordable to those with wealthy parents, draining their life savings, or those paying their own way will have a crushing debt on graduation day. The resulting polarization between the "haves" and the "have nots" is a recipe for disaster.
- * We will never receive all of the money we put into Social Security, which involuntarily drains resources we could otherwise put toward retirement, and do so more profitably. Don't be surprised if the inevitable generational war, caused by too few workers supporting too many retirees, results in covert genocide of the elderly.
- * Many of us consider our homes to be our primary retirement asset. As we retire, the decrease in demand caused by fewer prospective buyers in the next generation will cause home prices to drop precipitously. The same could be said of our stock portfolios.
- * The obscene national debt will never be paid in our lifetime. In addition, future political leaders, regardless of the party, will maintain their greed for power and control through ever-increasing taxes. This will result in less money in our pockets for basic survival needs, and less capital available for the more-efficient private sector to create the means to enhance our lives, from safer cars to life-saving medical devices.

Forewarned is forearmed. It is not too late to start planning to take care of the future for yourself and your family. More than ever before, we cannot let ourselves be lulled by the belief that tomorrow will take care of itself. Ours is the first generation for which addressing this need may not be a matter of comfort, but one of survival.
