We Are Not Alone

Have you ever looked at the ad for Intertel in the Mensa Bulletin and wondered what that organization was about? You're already part of a VERY limited group of people who have only one thing in common...intelligence. You've scored in the top two percent on a standardized IQ test or other measurement tool.

Mensa is the largest and oldest organization devoted to serving a unique group of people who



share a high IQ (Intelligence quotient, but you already knew that, right?) It includes more than 110,000 members worldwide.

Intertel calls itself, "An International Society of the Intellectually Gifted." Wait, you are already in Mensa and you KNOW you are intellectually gifted. What's the difference? Intertel requires a score at or above the 99th percentile on a standardized IQ test. That means that about half of our members should be eligible (no, this is NOT a statistical fact, just opinion).

Intertel was founded in 1966 and has about 1,200 members in thirty countries. Their purpose, according to their website (<u>intertel-iq.org</u>) is to "encourage meaningful intellectual fellowship, foster an exchange of ideas on any and all subjects, and to assist in research relating to high intelligence.

Okay, so I decided to submit my Mensa admission scores to see if I qualified. I did, which truly surprised me. (I still think I need to be retested for Mensa qualification sometimes.)

I decided to do a little more research on organizations devoted to intelligence. If you think you are pretty cool because you qualified for Mensa, there are some other IQ groups out there and some are even more restrictive (elite?)

The Sigma Society, (<u>sigmasociety.com</u>) is a more recent group, formed in 1999, but claims to have 200 members from forty countries. They have levels of membership; from a score in the top 97.7 percent to one is the top 99.9999999 percent, or an IQ over 196 with 100 being the average.

Another organization limiting its membership to the top one percent is called the "Top One Percent Society (<u>toponesociety.com</u>)" (A very descriptive name!) It was founded in 1989 and claims to, "be dedicated to the intellectual stimulation and growth of its members." I am having a hard time understanding what "growth of its members means."

My search continued and I found a group called Colloquy, which is an organization for people who are in the top 99.5 percent, or above 140 IQ according to their website (<u>colloquysociety.org</u>). They claim to be the first high-IQ society based entirely on the Internet, "to the best of our knowledge." (If they are truly in the top .5 percent, that is pretty good odds that they are correct.)

If you think that IQ groups couldn't get any more elite, you are wrong. The Infinity International Society (<u>iisiq.org</u>) was formed in 2007 and requires an IQ of 140, or 99.63 percentile, for inclusion. Their purpose is, "to interact with each other in stimulating online forum discussions and to share in the camaraderie of our fellowship.

The Cerebrals require an even higher score, one in the 99.7th percentile! The Cerebrals (<u>cerebrals.org</u>) is "dedicated to the search of high intellectual giftedness among individuals, bringing highly gifted individuals together." They don't have a lot of information about membership on their site, but I'm sure they would welcome anyone who can pas the Cerebrals Cognitive Ability Tests!

If you want to keep raising the bar, check out the Glia Society (<u>gilesociety.com</u>), which calls itself the "World-wide Hyperbrain." You must qualify in the 99.9th percentile on two separate tests. I especially appreciated their FAQ page, which states, "If one cannot qualify, one does not belong here."

If you don't want to join the Gila Society with an IQ in the 99.9th percentile, you can go to the International Society for Philosophical Enquiry (<u>thethousand.com</u>) or I.S.P.E. If you scored in the top .01 percent of the population in a standardized IQ test, you will qualify. Their charter (goals) is extensive and includes, "to extend our potentials through heath and longevity." I find this to be a very lofty goal!

There are a number of organizations that require an IQ score over 99.9 percent. The One-in-a-thousand Society (<u>oathsociety.com</u>), founded in 1992, is "dedicated to the friendship and communication among intellectually gifted adults."

The Triple Nine Society (<u>triplenine.org</u>) requires an IQ score in the 99.9th percentile and is, "committed to friendship, communication, the adventure of intellectual exploration, and a greater realization of individual potentials." They have members in more than twenty countries

The sPIqr Society (<u>spiqrsociety.webs.com</u>) was founded in 2010 and limits membership to anyone scoring in the top 99.98th percentile. *Continued on next page*

Want to be even more exclusive? Check out the Prometheus Society (<u>prometheussociety.org</u>) formed in 1982, "to promote fellowship among individuals with extremely high intelligence." You must score on an accepted IQ test in the highest one thirty thousandth of the general population (I think this means 99.997th percentile). They are not accepting applications for membership until they are "done investigating some problems with selected admission tests.

If you did score in the top one thirty thousandth of the population you could check out Ultranet (<u>megafoundation.org</u>), a newer organization that was formed in 1999 for "extremely gifted adults with an IQ of 164 or greater." They are associated with the Tianadara Ranch in Missouri where they hold retreats for members.

So, you thought you were in a pretty limited group of people when you joined Mensa. Me too, but maybe I'll check out some of these other groups before someone at Mensa finds out I need to be retested!



Stout Stuff—Strong Unstuffy Writing

Rex Stout fans: Rejoice! Nero Wolfe lives. Archie Goodwin lives.

Stout Stuff is "Satisfactory," Nero Wolfe would say. But the rest of us might say, "It is not only satisfactory, it is superb."

This book, an homage to mystery writer Rex Stout, contains a novella followed by two essays. In the first essay, Ouellette discusses his personal ups and downs planning, writing, and re-writing the novella, *Murder in Terms of Death*. In the second, he takes on the challenges any author faces when writing fiction.

Murder in Terms of Death features the two well-known literary characters Nero Wolfe and Archie Goodwin, a pair almost as famous as Sherlock Holmes and Dr. Watson. The corpulent genius Wolfe stays in his New York brownstone living the good life, raising orchids, eating the delectable food prepared by his personal chef, and waiting; crimes, clients, and Inspector Cramer come to his door. Archie, of course, delivers the facts to Wolfe in all their cases. This one involves Shakespearian actors, TV personalities, old theater programs, and bilingualism. Wolfe, naturally, solves the crime of what turns out to be a triple homicide.

Ouellette is a skilled writer who successfully re-creates the voices of Archie and Wolfe; the tone of this novella is perfect; it reads like a long-lost Rex Stout manuscript. Mystery lovers, especially Rex Stout fans, literature or drama students, Shakespeare buffs, or general readers who just like a good story should enjoy *Stout Stuff*.

Books On the Runway

Title: Founding Mothers: The Women Who Raised Our Nation

Author: Cokie Roberts Year: 2004

Book Description: An absorbing social history of the women who stood beside (not behind) the Founding Fathers, and provided invaluable support to the careers and political aspirations of these iconic men. This is a practically dayby-day account of the prodigious efforts of these women to keep family households and businesses solvent, raise healthy children, fend off marauders and enemy soldiers, and provide practical suggestions to their loved ones – often accompanying them to battlefields - while the men waged war and created a new form of government. Examples of the many women highlighted are Eliza Lucas Pinckney, who managed three plantations and conducted agriculture experiments during her teen years; Deborah Read Franklin, who financially backed her husband Benjamin's foreign assignments through real estate ventures and the management of the post office; Mercy Otis Warren, author of political pamphlets and plays, as well as a massive tome on the history of the American Revolution; Abigail Adams, outspoken promoter of women's rights and adviser to her husband, John Adams, throughout his political career; and Elizabeth "Mumbet" Freeman, a slave whose successful suit to obtain her freedom led to the abolition of slavery in Massachusetts.

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how? Reading this book confirmed my belief that, although a man may be able to sire either a child or an idea, a woman's rationality, resourcefulness, and dedication is vital to its continued survival. It truly appealed to the feminist in me.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? Anyone with a literary appetite for American history and a desire to learn more about the little-known contributions of women to the founding of our nation. Roberts, a renowned and award-winning television and newspaper journalist, based her narrative on personal documents, letters, and journals that were typically difficult to obtain and even harder to read. She has admirably overcome these challenges and managed to produce a colorful and richly-detailed tribute to a group of exceptional women – an admirable accomplishment in itself.

How long might it take to read this book? A maximum of one week, I would say.

Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote: "When I first started learning about the women who influenced the

Founding Fathers, I thought they might represent a unique generation, in the way we have always been told that the men of the era were unique. After all, they lived in a time – declaring independence and fighting a war for it, crafting a constitution, forming a new government – that will never be repeated. John Quincy Adams subscribed to the thesis that his mother's generation was unique when he complained to her that there were no modern women like her. Abigail, God love her, shot back that women might act frivolous and flighty, but only because men wanted them to...But as I got to know these women, [I] came to the conclusion that there's nothing unique about them. They did – with great hardship, courage, pluck, prayerfulness, sadness, joy, energy, and humor – what women do. They put one foot in front of the other in remarkable circumstances. They carried on. They are truly our Founding Mothers.
