

Four To The Fore

This month's column is a reminder of the RVC support funds that local groups may request. This fiscal year, each RVC was provided with one thousand dollars to distribute to local groups. As detailed in a previous column, here is my process for Region 4 (your region of Mensa):

1. Talk with your local group president (LocSec) and Local Group Executive Board, first. Your LocSec and ExComm must be on board with this before I will consider funding anything for any local group.



2. Have your LocSec get in touch with me after you know things have a green light in your local group.

3. After I have spoken with your LocSec and confirmed that he/she is on board with your idea(s), I will then get in contact with you to discuss things further.

4. After I have had time to consider your plan/project, I will then let you know if I am able to provide funds for it.

At this point, the funds are halfway distributed. I already have groups desiring to double dip with worthy projects/ideas. December 31, 2016 is my cutoff for groups to request funds for the first time. Come January 2017, I will begin allowing groups to "double dip," as it were. The fiscal year ends at the end of March 2017.

So, for the 6 out of 9 groups in region 4 who haven't received any of these funds yet, get your requests and proposals lined up ASAP. Obviously, not every group will receive something. Once the funds are gone they are gone for this fiscal year.

This money was earmarked to benefit local groups. Let it benefit yours.



Books On the Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Title: 100 of the Worst Ideas in History: Humanity's Thundering Brainstorms Turned Blundering Brain Farts **Author:** Michael N Smith and Eric Kasum **Year:** 2014

Book Description: This delightfully entertaining volume contains a varied collection of notable lapses in judgment throughout human history. Expanding on the central question, "What were



they thinking?," journalists Smith and Kasum present numerous examples of abject stupidity covering a wide range of professions, cultures, and eras, categorized as follows: (1) Whopping Historical Foul-Ups and Faux Pas; (2) Entertainers with Stars in Their Eyes (and Rocks in Their Heads); (3) Inept Inventions, Pitiful Products, and Senseless Services; (4) Politically Incorrect Politicos; (5) Stupidity at a Major-League Level; (6) War Strategies That Bombed; (7) A Healthy Dose of Dumb, (8) In the News and Out of Their Minds; (9) Stinky Thinking from Air, Land, and Sea; and (10) Mad Scientists and the Monsters They Create. A few notable examples contained within are: Archduke Franz Ferdinand's limo driver chauffeuring the Austrio-Hungarian royal into an assasin's sights, thereby starting WWI; Attorney General Robert Kennedy and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover's investigation of the "obscene" lyrics in the pop song, "Louie Louie"; and, perhaps the mother ship of all cerebral screwups - the RMS Titanic, which sailed away with five blatantly bad ideas that ultimately cost 1,700 passengers and crew members their lives.

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how? The acquisition of this book at Lehman's Amish Country Gifts in Kidron, Ohio, during my annual Ohio Light Opera sojourn, marks the third year in the row that I unearthed a treasure among the Christianoriented literature that the store typically offers. The book, as well as the firstrate entertainment and shopping opportunities in the Wooster area, offered a refreshing change from the past year's acrimonious political scene. Ironically, the book has renewed my faith in humanity, as it exemplifies our ability to laugh at our follies and learn from our more serious mistakes.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? This droll and irreverent peek at past failures should appeal to readers with a passion for trivia and puns. My apologies in advance to Mensans who may accuse me of desecrating hallowed ground by including the excerpt below, which lampoons the Stanford-Binet IQ test. (As Patrick Henry said, if this be treason, make the most of it.)

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How long might it take to read this book? An easy and fun reading experience full of short and deliciously sweet anecdotes, as well as intriguing sidebars and photos, this book can be absorbed in less than a day.

Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote: "A Dumb Way to Test How Smart You Are. The Bad Idea: The IQ Test. The Genius Behind It: French Psychologist Alfred Binet. The Brainstorm Struck: 1911. Bring on the Blunder: While his cousin Charles Darwin theorizes on the origin of the human species, British scientist Frances Galton theorizes on the origins of human intelligence - and posits that such intelligence is measurable. With Galton's hypothesis in hand, Alfred Binet and Stanford psychologist Lewis Terman create the Stanford-Binet Intelligence Quotient. It's the first human intelligence test. And although widely embraced, critics nonetheless declare it to be IQ: Incomplete and Questionable. From Bad to Worse: The main complaint: the IQ test covers only reasoning, vocabulary, and problem solving. Creativity is not considered. Intuition is not evaluated. Originality, humor, verbal aptitude - many of the characteristics of intellects are not assessed. Therefore opponents claim that IO is a weak (if not false) indicator of true intelligence and future achievement. Dumb Luck: 'Intelligence is a much more complex thing than what the test measures,' reasons Dr. Morton Beiser of the University of Toronto. Furthermore, psychologist Howard Gardner of Harvard, a pioneer in the research of 'interpersonal intelligence' (social skills) and 'intrapersonal intelligence' (knowing one's self), notes that IQ tests measure neither and therefore are not the most intelligent ways to evaluate intelligence. After Thoughts: Despite its shortcomings, the IQ test, an industrial-age relic, remains the most highly regarded indicator of intelligence today."

Additional Remarks: I am reviewing this book specifically for the December 2016 MIND because I consider it an ideal stocking stuffer. It can be purchased for a mere \$15.00 plus shipping from <u>www.sourcebooks.com</u> or <u>www.lehmans.com</u> - well within the price range of most prospective Santas. Happy Folly Days!


