Jon's Journal – News for Region 4

Hopefully your New Year's resolutions are still in full force. A few years ago, I made a resolution not to make any more resolutions. That's worked really well so far.

If one of your resolutions was to attend the Annual Gathering in Indianapolis from July 4-8, now's the time to register. Starting March 1st, the price goes up from \$199 to \$229; starting June 15th, it's \$259. The Gala dinner speaker will be astronaut David Wolf, MD. A veteran of seven spacewalks and a one-time Mir resident, Dr. Wolf has logged more than 4,040 hours in spaces. Meet the astronaut, medical doctor, and Indy native who has worn many hats and helmets during his Walter Mitty-like career.



Last month's article discussed American Mensa's revenues; this month, let's look at expenses. I'm again using figures from the most recently completed fiscal year ending March 31, 2017. These are posted on our website in the form of audited financial statements and budget reports.


Overall expenses were \$4,665,520. That exceeded our revenues by \$285,824. According to the audited financial statements, this broke down as:

- 23% - Membership / Testing
- 18% - Local Group Support
- 17% - Management and General
- 15% - Publications and Public Education
- 13% - Events
- 8% - Public Relations
- 6% - Governance

Since some costs such as salaries were allocated across multiple categories, a different view of expenses summarized from the budget report was more informative:

Just as with most non-manufacturing operations, people and paper represent the biggest costs. The next biggest chunk is money we send to fund Local Groups and Mensa International. The “bank / credit card fees” category is mostly the processing costs for membership renewals and AG payments.

Every year our Board of Directors (AMC) votes on the budget recommended by the Finance Committee. This generally happens in March to prepare for the April start of our fiscal year. As a first term RVC, that meeting will be my first formal opportunity to weigh in on our finances. Any feedback you have would be welcome.

Books On The Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Title: *On Tyranny: Twenty Lessons from the Twentieth Century*

Author: Timothy Snyder

This diminutive volume - a mere 126 pages and small enough to fit in a pocket or handbag - is what I

consider the definitive political primer for every American motivated to maintain a rational rule of law and preserve the individual freedoms that we continue to enjoy. After briefly summarizing the intent of the Founding Fathers when they formulated the Constitution - to “avoid the usurpation of power by an individual or group” - and promoting the examination of history for reasons for the success or failure of recent democracies, the author proposes an antidote for our most deadly disease, *tyranny*, defined by my Oxford dictionary as “the cruel and arbitrary use of authority. His twenty lessons from the twentieth century arise from what the author deems as three “major democratic moments” - the end of World War I in 1918, the end of World War II in 1945, and the end of communism in 1989 - and explain the resultant worldwide political cataclysms, while giving readers dire warnings about the aftereffects of the 2016 U.S. presidential election. He expounds on topics germane to the health of a democratic nation: institutions, political parties (two or more), professional ethics, truth, investigative journalism, empathy, resistance, privacy protection, philanthropy, overseas travel, liberty (vs. security), patriotism, and (most important) courage - as well as signs of trouble: blind obedience, obsession with symbols, conformism, language distortion, and terror management. Also included is a list of recommended reading for critical thinkers, from J. K. Rowling to the teachings of Jesus in the Bible. The author concludes his own sermon with an admonishment against complacency (the politics of inevitability) or cynicism (the politics of eternity). He urges all of us to take instruction from history, which “allows us to see patterns and make judgments,” and - perhaps using his “small but mighty” volume as a guidebook - make a personal commitment to liberty.

NOTE: I have dispensed with my usual - and lengthier - form due to time constraints. At this writing, I am juggling three activities: work, household decluttering, and theater. Happily, I am scheduled to retire by the end of January, so I will be back in full force for the March 2018 MIND. I thank you for your understanding and indulgence.



Central Indiana Mensa ExCom 11/21/17

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held at Midwest Internet on Tuesday, November 21, 2017. LocSec Jan Pfeil Doyle called the meeting to order at 6:47 pm. Members present were Jon Applegate (via Skype), Jan Pfeil Doyle, Ann Hake, Ethan Blocher-Smith, Diane O'Brien, Karen Wilczewski, Kurt Williams, Bob Zdanky, and Karen Zwick.

The committee reviewed the minutes of the October ExCom meeting. Karen Zwick moved that the minutes be accepted. Diane O'Brien seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The committee reviewed the Treasurer's report. Ann Hake moved that the Treasurer's report be accepted as presented. Kurt Williams seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

A membership report was compiled by Jan Pfeil Doyle based upon the information available as of 10/31/2017 from American Mensa: 517 members, 2 new, 1 move-in, 3 rejoins, and 8 prospects.

Old Business

2018 Annual Gathering: Planning continues steadily. Meeting and hotel registration opened on line on November 1, and is going well. Proposals for speakers are being solicited.

Treasurer Karen Zwick presented a financial analysis of the income and expenses for CIM since the beginning of 2013. It was noted that income and expenses were essentially steady throughout this period for all items examined with the exception of facility expenses for the Monthly Gathering, which jumped from \$525 and \$315 in 2013 and 2014, respectively, to \$1210 in 2015 and \$1653 in 2016 and in 2017. It was judged by the ExCom that much of the progressive trend of the imbalance between income and expense lay with this increase in cost of the Monthly Gathering, and it was agreed that changes should be made to address the increased costs. Kurt Williams moved that, beginning with the March 2018 Monthly Gathering, the admission fee be raised to \$7 for members, \$10 for nonmembers, and \$5 for children/students under 18 (no charge for children under 6). Ethan Blocher-Smith seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

A response was received from our RVC, Jon Gruebele, to our letter that we sent him following the announcement of the resignation of the Executive Director of American Mensa. (In this letter, we had expressed our strong opinion that AML should be transparent in its business and financial transactions and make all of its financial statements visible to its members.) He advised us of filings in which these figures can be found (with a bit of digging). He will be a member of the search committee for the new ED.

The 2018 Mensa testing schedule has been set; 12 tests have been scheduled so far, including 2 at the AG.

New Business

The December Monthly Gathering will be our traditional holiday pitch-in; ExCom will provide the meat.

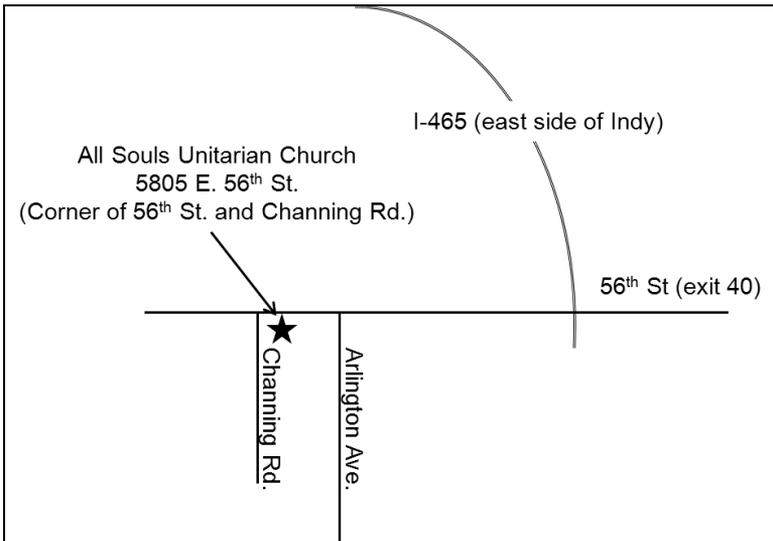
