In order for these **proposed** bylaws to become our **new** bylaws the CIM membership must approve them with a 2/3 majority and then the national committee will set an 'effective date' when they will become official.

The trip to the Exotic Feline Rescue Center on April 16th turned out to be a day with perfect weather. We had a total of 14 people take the tour, beginning with breakfast at the Sunrise Family Restaurant in Brazil. It's good food and worth the drive if you're in the area. We then traveled to the EFRC which is the home of over 200 big cats representing nine species. We got to see one cat coming back from a dentist appointment and we got to watch the cats eat their lunch – which consists of 4,000 pounds of meat per day in total. Seeing the cats in this setting was quite an experience since we were able to see them in a much different environment than in a zoo. Everyone learned something new about big cats that day.

On Saturday, June 4, Mensa Youth visited the Medical History Museum on the west side of Indianapolis. Although there were only seven of us, we thoroughly

enjoyed touring the old Pathology Building located on the grounds of the old Central State Hospital. It was built in 1896 and last used in the 60's. It has been restored to be as close as possible to the way it was when psychiatric patients at the hospital were studied to gain insight into neurological trauma and diseases. From the auditorium where lectures were conducted to the various testing labs, we had a guided tour of the instruments and facilities used at the time. A master gardener then gave a tour of the botanical garden located next the building and identified various plants used in medicine and alternative medicine, both then and now. If you haven't visited the museum, you can call to arrange a guided tour – it's a fascinating place.

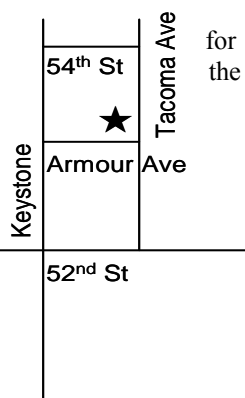

Below is the process I am implementing:



Books On the Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Title: *The Professor and the Madman: A Tale of Murder, Insanity, and the Making of the Oxford English Dictionary*

Author: Simon Winchester

Year: 1998



Book Description: As any competent writer will assert, fact and fiction are symbiotic in that the best fiction is based on fact, and the truth is often much more bizarre than anything conceived by the most fertile literary imagination. This writing principle is vividly epitomized in *The Professor and the Madman*, a lively and fascinating recounting of the little-known story behind the creation of the Oxford English Dictionary. The two major contributors - the story's two protagonists, Dr. James Murray and Dr. William Minor - are introduced in the prologue via the mythical meeting of these two philological minds at Dr. Minor's residence, which happened to be two cells in the Broadmoor Asylum for the Criminally Insane in London (an excerpt is quoted below). The backgrounds of both men are then explored: James Murray's working-class background, sketchy formal education, and passion for learning that ultimately propelled him to membership in the London Philological Society and a position on the Oxford dictionary team; and William Minor's "old money" status, his upbringing in Ceylon as the son of Congregationalist missionaries, his medical training at Yale University, his horrific experiences as a Civil War medical officer, his subsequent licentious and irrational behavior during tours of duty in New York and Florida, his mandatory retirement from the Army due to a diagnosis of "monomania," his emigration to London for "recuperation," and the crime of passion that resulted in his incarceration in the Asylum. The convoluted plot continues with the Philological Society's decision to compile a complete English language reference for the sake of the Empire; the establishment of the requirements for each word; the advertisement in various publications for volunteer readers and word definers; William Minor's enlistment on the team; the actual meeting of Drs. Murray and Minor, and their decades-long friendship and professional collaboration; and finally, Dr. Minor's tragically anti-climactic mental decline (in more ways than one - please read the book for the lurid details). After briefly alluding to the demise of Drs. Murray and Minor, the author ends the book with a tribute to Dr. Minor's homicide victim, George Merrett (to whom he has also dedicated his book), "without whose untimely death these events would never have unfolded, and this tale could never have been told." The book's atmospheric, ghost-story tone is enhanced by intricately engraved illustrations, and each chapter is headed by the O. E. D. definition of a word that is germane to the primary topic of the chapter. Example: **Mysterious** (mistīə-riəs), *a.* [f. L.

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mysterium Mystery¹ + ous. Cf F. *mysterieux*.] 1. Full of or fraught with mystery; wrapt in mystery; hidden from human knowledge or understanding; impossible or difficult to explain, solve, or discover; of obscure origin, nature. or purpose.

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how? Although I have long been aware of the status of the Oxford English Dictionary as the foremost authority on the English language, I possessed no knowledge of the nature of its origin, or even the number of volumes that comprise the work in its entirety, prior to perusing *The Professor and the Madman*. I am in awe of what the team of nineteenth-century lexicographers - Drs. Murray and Minor in particular - managed to accomplish without the benefit of the types of efficient communication that we take for granted, the seven-decade completion time of the project notwithstanding. This fascinating account of their undoubtedly remarkable achievement has revived my faith in humanity that had recently been savaged by several self-acclaimed worldwide political leaders. Long live the O.E.D.!

Who should definitely read this book? Why? I highly recommend this book to everyone with a modicum of intellectual curiosity, particularly linguists, historians, sociologists, scientists, and psychologists - as well as Anglophiles, artists, and mystery lovers. In fact, I cannot imagine a single Mensan who would not enjoy this intimate journey into the academic world of Victorian England. It is truly - pardon the pun - spellbinding.

How long might it take to read this book? The modest size of the volume - a mere 242 pages counting the author's appended note, acknowledgments, and suggestions for further reading - and the captivately colorful narrative should ensure that the reader will breeze through this book in just two or three days.

Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote: "...At the railway station a polished landau and a liveried coachman were waiting, and with James Murray aboard they clip-clopped back through the lanes of rural Berkshire. After twenty minutes or so the carriage turned up a long drive lined with tall poplars, drawing up eventually outside a huge and rather forbidding red-brick mansion. A solemn servant showed the lexicographer upstairs, and into a book-lined study, where behind an immense mahogany desk stood a man of undoubted importance. Dr. Murray bowed gravely, and launched into the brief speech of greeting that he had so long rehearsed: 'A very good afternoon to you, sir. I am Dr. James Murray of the London Philological Society, editor of the *Oxford English Dictionary*. It is indeed an honour and a pleasure to at long last make your acquaintance - for you must be, kind sir, my most assiduous helpmeet, Dr. W. C. Minor?' 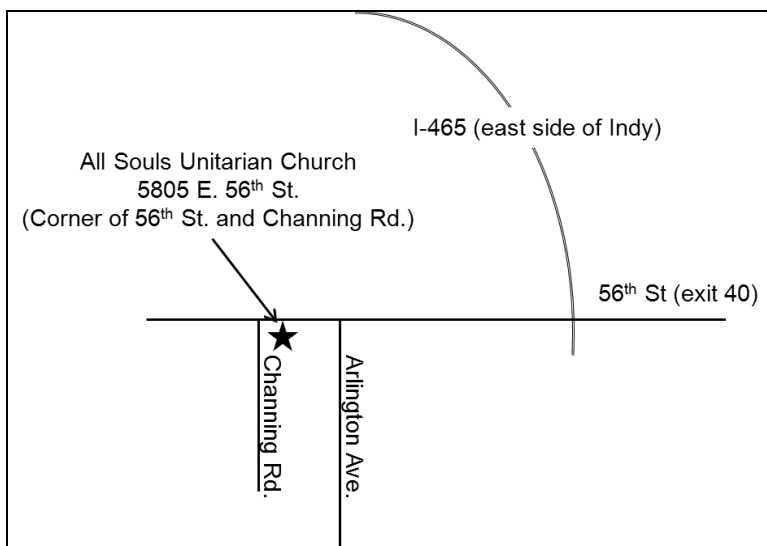
