How Do You Define Yourself?

Recently I noticed a minivan sporting a license plate, "CEO MOM." Immediately I knew the woman who owned that vehicle had one or more children and a professional career. That's a lot to glean from a twelve inch piece of metal tacked to a bumper, but it was evident this was how she defined herself, as both a CEO and a Mom.



If you had to limit your identity to a few letters on a license plate, what would it be? How would you define yourself?

There's a poem called "The Dash," by Linda Ellis that asks the reader to think about "how you spend your dash?" The dash is the short line between the year of your birth and your death that appears on your tombstone. What happens during your life is condensed into one short line, or a "dash between the years." (The poem is well worth the time to find and read.)*

When you respond to a stranger's introduction, what terms do you use to describe yourself, both personally and professionally? The way we define ourselves gives others a glimpse into our self-esteem and attitude toward our own achievements. Trying to explain who you are in only a few words is very revealing. Do you describe yourself in positive terms or are they words that diminish your identity?

As the woman in the mini-van defines herself as CEO MOM, each of us must think about who we are and how we identify ourselves to others. What are you doing with your time within the dash?

During my childhood, one of my brothers had a paper route. When someone asked him about himself, he responded (with all seriousness) that he was a "news transfer agent." He placed a great deal of importance in delivering the newspaper to his customers each day and this pride in his efforts was evident.

When your family and friends gather at your funeral to recall the things you have done and the legacy you have left behind, will they describe your life with words that reflect the importance of your personal or professional accomplishments? Think about "The Dash Poem" where Linda Ellis asks, "Will you be proud of the things they say about how you spent your dash?"

Books on the Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Title: The Private Lives of Birds: A Scientist Reveals the Intricacies of Avian

Social Life

Author: Bridget Stutchbury

Year: 2010

Book Description: This is a fascinating account of the unorthodox research projects undertaken by biologist Stutchbury and her teams of "bird detectives," and the intriguing insights into bird behavior gained through these experiments (graphs and tables are included for scientifically-oriented readers). The author provides explicit and lucid answers to such questions as: Why are some species of birds monogamous while others are habitual philanderers? What physical qualities do female birds prefer in a mate, and why? How does the slaying of a chick by its sibling help ensure the survival of a species? In what ways do birds use their singing as a means of communication (more numerous than is commonly believed)? What are the comparative advantages and disadvantages of nuclear versus colonial avian lifestyles?

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how? The book reveals many behavioral similarities between birds and humans that I had not previously suspected. Apparently, birds often conduct themselves in ways that we humans might consider morally questionable, but for reasons much more compelling than mere gratuitous pleasure. It also confirms my conviction that crowding and overpopulation are major causes of resource depletion and environmental deterioration.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? This book is a must-read for nature enthusiasts – particularly, amateur and professional biologists, ornithologists, and environmental scientists.

How long might it take to read this book? The clear, concise writing style should enable the reader to finish in just one to two days.

Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote: "The natural forces that have shaped bird behaviour* for thousands of years have shifted as seasons change, food supplies crash, and habitats disappear. Behaviours* that once paid high dividends may today doom an individual, and a species, to failure. Birds are linked together, and to us, by the challenges of living in the drastically remodelled* environment that has come with explosive human population growth. Birds connect people with nature because they are beautiful, have fascinating lives, and in many ways remind us of ourselves." *NOTE: Alternate spellings reflect the author's Canadian origins.

Additional Remarks: Although the book's epilogue grimly delineates the devastating effects of recent human intervention on the earth's environment (e.g., the real reason for the passenger pigeon's extinction), it ends on a positive note, to wit: "[H]uman attitudes and knowledge about the environment and our dependence on functioning ecosystems have evolved rapidly in the past century. There is hope, because humans are the ultimate example of behavioural flexibility and cultural change." Thus, high motivation and willingness to learn from past mistakes may be our ultimate salvation, as well as that of our avian comrades.




In Case You Missed It

Central Indiana Mensa ExCom Minutes 5/27/14

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held at Midwest Internet on Tuesday, May 27, 2014.

LocSec Jan Pfeil Doyle called the meeting to order at 6:55 p.m. Members present included: Jan Pfeil Doyle, David Culp, Teresa Gregory, Ann Hake, Karen Steilberger, Karen Wilczewski, Bob Zdanky, and Karen Zwick. Guests: Alison Brown and Jud Horning.

The committee reviewed the minutes of the April ExCom meeting. Ann Hake moved that the minutes be accepted as presented, Karen Zwick seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

Karen Zwick presented the Treasurer's report. She reported that the separate Gathering bank account has been closed and is now incorporated with the regular account and integrated into her accounting system. This will make the reports she sends to National much easier to produce. She asked if there is a need to keep the amount from this account separate on the balance sheet. The ExCom said there is not. David Culp made a motion to accept the report, Ann Hake seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The membership report shows 3 new, 1 move-in, and 7 reinstating members, and 21 prospects.

Old Business

2014 OG: Jan Pfeil Doyle gave a recap of the OG. There were over 30 attendees, including some from Michigan, Ohio, and Illinois. Teresa Gregory said that Cyndi Kuyper usually calls the park the day after the OG to reserve the same site for next year. Teresa will verify that she did that.

Elections: Jan Pfeil Doyle said that there are 14 nominees on the slate at this time.

New Business

Member initiatives: Jan Pfeil Doyle said she had received two memos from George Dunn: one stating that he is putting together a Culture Quest team for next year; and the other saying that he and Rhoda Israelov are proposing a formal group activity to be held at the conclusion of the monthly gatherings. The committee discussed the proposal and agreed that it would be all right if it is 1) optional; 2) held after the speaker's presentation is complete; and 3) in a designated part of the meeting room so that those who do not wish to participate may stay and socialize.

Buzz Fund event: Jan Pfeil Doyle said there has been a suggestion that a *Continued on next page*

committee be formed to decide on the event for which the Buzz Fund money

will be spent. She suggested that Carl Levinson, the donor of the shirts from which the funds are coming, be invited to participate. Karen Zwick, Karen Wilczewski, Karen Steilberger, and Teresa Gregory will assist, and other members are welcome as well.

Picnic: Jan Pfeil Doyle asked if we want to have a picnic this year. The committee discussed the question. Teresa said perhaps it has run its course and we should put our energies into the 50th anniversary event we want to have later this year.

AMC Meeting: Jan Pfeil Doyle said that our bid to host the March 2015 American Mensa Committee meeting was accepted. We do not need to do hotel arrangements, but we will be the host group. Teresa Gregory said that the last time we did this, two years ago, National provided a budget for hospitality.

Jean Rodgers: Jan Pfeil Doyle said that Jean Rodgers passed away on May 2. Karen Zwick will send a donation from Central Indiana Mensa. A collection is in progress for a memorial brick in the "Walk of Minds" in front of the Mensa Education and Research Foundation building in Texas. Funds collected above the \$200 amount for the brick will be donated to the John Matthews scholarship fund.

Things to think about: Jan Pfeil Doyle asked the committee to think about 1) ways to get more of the shirts out to those who might like them; and 2) an opportunity we have to move the RG from late January to June or August. Teresa Gregory asked the committee to think about ways to promote Mensa to non-members, including consideration of Jan Greene's idea of giving a discount on the RG to members who bring guests, or Teresa's alternate idea of offering guests who pay for a full weekend a free admissions test.

There being no other business, David Culp made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Karen Zwick seconded the motion. The motion was carried, and the meeting was adjourned at 7:46 p.m.


