Doing Time

Our prison system is just another bureaucratic institution, with one unique charge. It gleefully implements the terrorization of the American people by its own elected officials. It imprisons the highest percentage of its population by any country simply because many of its victims do not belong there. They are the casualties of our lawmakers' bloodlust for power, facilitated by the lie that

the answer to every societal ill is to pass more laws. The result is the criminalization of acts that are innocuous and victimless.

Once established, any institution's prime objective becomes self-perpetuation. Existence justification becomes a top priority, even at the price of the truth. Prevarication is rationalized as the end justifying the means.

Laws are rarely repealed. This would loosen our government's grip on power. Worse yet, it would be the tacit admission of a mistake. The sad truth is that the prison system revels in the fact that more laws create more prospective inmates.

At one time, even if only in theory, prison was intended to punish and rehabilitate. The only people who are punished are those who should not be imprisoned, but are, the victims of laws which do not belong in a nation which claims to be the world's bellwether for freedom.

Inmates are warehoused, not rehabilitated. People who aren't true criminals when they are imprisoned learn to become criminals by the time they are released. This, coupled with the fact that no one will give them a channce to earn an honest living, results in recidivism, and justification for more prisons, which might as well have revolving doors.

Those who do belong in prison enjoy a life better than they deserve, paid for by taxpayers. Air conditioning, weight rooms, and conjugal visits are among their ostensible benefits. More furtive perquisites include contraband, condoned by guards bribed to look the other way, often resulting in a better life than the criminals would have on the outside.

The end result is a lack of respect for authority, and a feeling of powerlessness over one's own life. Please recall my article from the September MIND titled,"There Ought to Be a Law?" Anyone could be imprisoned for violating the ludicrous statutes cited. Adding laws gives legislators their own vehicle for existence justification, and lets them sell their lie of trying to keep honest Americans safe. In reality, it is the honest people who have the most to fear.

The demagoguery surrounding drunk driving is a perfect example. The relatively few people responsible for a high percentage of societal harm from drunk driving are mollycoddled. However, those who test above the arbitrary legal limit one time (despite having caused no harm) are persecuted. Many people have been arrested for drunk driving in their own driveways, after having caused no injury or damage. These people have comitted no crime. They are victims of oppression! They may have drawn attention for having a broken taillight, but the authorities won't let an opportunity to torment them slip by, thanks to the fact that they have convinced the public that such people are a menace. This makes as little sense as being arrested for legally carrying a gun into a bank and committing no criminal act. It is not politically correct to speak on behalf of anyone turned into a pariah by a drunk driving conviction, regardless of the circumstances. Yet, no one calls for sanctions against those who cause traffic deaths due to senility or stupidity. The majority of traffic injuries and deaths are not alcohol-related. Look it up!* Why is it okay to punish a person for one harmless mistake, but not an octogenarian who can't think or see clearly and causes a death? Because the system said so, that's why!

Lest you think this dissertation is born of self-interest, I don't drink. So, just get over that suspicion of my motivation. My underlying principle is common sense.

Sadly, other crimes which should not even be on the books, much less

mandate prison time, account for numerous other people behind bars who do not belong there. Worse yet, true criminals connot be jailed because there is no room for them, their space having been taken by victims of pseudo-crimes. The fact that genuine criminals are walking our streets justifies politicians' clamoring for more police officers.

The ever-increasing intrusion by the authorities into areas which are none of their business is the very reason for the proliferation of militia and other anti-government groups. People are tired of living in fear of those whose salaries they pay with their tax dollars!

Interestingly, this intrusion by government into places where it doesn't belong emulates the behavior of the masses. This same mania for control takes place on the individual level. It can be overt, such as your boss firing you for simply showing some individuality and not fitting into the company mold. Or, it can be more furtive, in the case of your spouse berating you for harmless comments made at a party.

It is this pushing into a person's emotional space when one should not that results in nefarious consequences, from shooting rampages by disgruntled exemployees, to schoolyard massacres, to uxoricide. Workplaces, schools, and spouses exert the most intensive peer pressure found in our society. While I abhor such egregious behavior, I can understand why it happens. Everyone has a breaking point, at which a law means nothing.

Please think about these things. Be very careful of intruding when you have no business doing so. For instance, you might consider refraining from asking questions that begin with "Why." The listener may feel as though you are asking for justification of a decision or an action which is none of your business. Worse yet, it may be inferred that you are questioning one's character. This perception could be harmful to a friendship, or worse. The next time someone tells you, "Don't go there," realize that heeding that advice might save your life.
