Liberty. We all want it, in some form or another. Most of us believe it is essential to the American way of life. Within Mensa we affirm as an organization that our only commonality is an IQ in the top 2 percent. As members we desire the liberty to enjoy our Mensa membership in a fashion that is as unique as each one of us. Correct? Back to Mensa in a moment....



I've been a lover of standup comedy ever since I was about 11 years old. A witty turn of phrase. A clever setup. An acerbic punch line. You're speaking one of my "love languages" if you can use those elements of comedy (to name a few) to capture my attention and actually make me laugh. Having been a consumer of comedy for most of my life, I decided in 2009, at the age of 40, to actually try being a standup comic. Books on the Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Title: Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children Author: Ransom Riggs *Year:* 2011

Book Description: As rocker Rod Stewart proclaimed in his 1971 hit LP, "Every picture tells a story." Although the author of *Miss Peregrine's Home for*

Peculiar Children is far too young to remember that recording, he seems to have taken its message to heart, inasmuch as he has mined his vast collection of unusual antique photographs for subject and plot ideas for his delightfully offbeat young adult novel. The starkly vivid black-and-white images are placed *Continued on next page*

strategically throughout the book to enhance the story line and add a cinematic element to the reading experience. The protagonist in this eerily fanciful tale is Jacob Portman, the sixteen-year-old scion of an affluent Jewish family residing in Florida. His grandfather's dramatic accounts of his escape from the Nazis during World War II and the Welsh boarding house in which he took refuge are Jacob's only relief from the stiflingly mundane existence for which he seems to be destined. Eventually, however, his grandfather's insistence on the veracity of his tales of extraordinarily gifted children and predatory monsters causes Jacob to wonder about the old man's mental stability (see the quote below). A horribly tragic event compels Jacob to journey to the elder Portman's childhood haunt to seek out the truth. There, on a wild and isolated Welsh island, the past and present intertwine as Jacob becomes acquainted with Abe Portman's "peculiar" classmates and their birdlike guardian, Miss Peregrine. His subsequent experiences with his highly unusual new friends are both exhilarating and frightening. As Jacob and his cohorts battle what is revealed to be a common enemy, he learns that safety is illusory, appearances are almost always deceptive, personal relationships should never be taken for granted, and eccentricities can be assets. Jacob's unorthodox education continues in two sequels currently available in bookstores: Hollow City and Library of Souls.

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how? The past two centuries have produced many distinguished authors of youth-oriented books, among whom are Laura Ingalls Wilder, J R R Tolkein, Louisa May Alcott, T. H. White, Edgar Rice Burroughs, and Mark Twain. In the twenty-first century, thanks to the immense popularity of the Harry Potter, Twilight, and Hunger Games series, young adult literature has been elevated to an art form and has earned its own category. I find this genre particularly enjoyable because each book is invariably written from a youthful perspective: candid, thoughtful, and emotionally-charged - appealing to the senses as well as the intellect. Ransom Riggs's debut novel beautifully fulfills this requirement, capturing the imagination while exploring such familiar themes as tolerance, friendship, group loyalty, resourcefulness, fear of the unknown, tyranny, and the quest for immortality.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? Connoisseurs of fantasy fiction will be intrigued by the ensemble of eccentric characters that populate Jacob Portman's world within and outside the island boarding house. These readers will recognize elements of Harry Potter, the X-men, Edward Scissorhands, and Alice in Wonderland, among others. Fellow Indy Mensan Teresa Gregory, in particular, will be gratified by the absence of vampires, werewolves, and zombies, all of which have recently been - pardon the expression - done to death.

How long might it take to read this book? The simple but colorful prose and spellbinding story guarantee a satisfying and speedy reading experience. One or two sittings, and the reader will be ready to move on to the first sequel - that is, unless he or she pauses to gaze at those mesmerizing old photographs.

Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote: "My grandfather was the only member of his family to escape Poland before the Second World War broke out. He was twelve years old when his parents sent him into the arms of strangers, putting their youngest son on a train to Britain with nothing more than a suitcase and the clothes on his back. It was a one-way ticket. He never saw his mother or father again, or his older brothers, his cousins, his aunts and uncles. Each one would be dead before his sixteenth birthday, killed by the monsters he had so narrowly escaped. But these weren't the kind of monsters that had tentacles and rotting skin, the kind a seven-yearold might be able to wrap his mind around - they were monsters with human faces, in crisp uniforms, marching in lockstep, so banal you don't recognize them for what they are until it's too late... Like the monsters, the enchanted island story was also a truth in disguise. Compared to the horrors of mainland Europe, the children's home that had taken in my grandfather must've seemed like a paradise, and so in his stories it had become one: a safe haven of endless summers and guardian angels and magical children, who couldn't really fly or turn invisible or lift boulders, of course. The peculiarity for which they'd been hunted was simply their Jewishness. They were orphans of war, washed up on that little island in a tide of blood. What made them amazing wasn't that they had miraculous powers; that they had escaped the ghettos and gas chambers was miracle enough."

Additional Remarks: The movie version of Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children is now in production; it stars Asa Butterfield as Jacob Portman, features Samuel L. Jackson, Judi Dench, and Rupert Everett in supporting roles, is directed by (who else?) Tim Burton, and will premier on Christmas Day, 2016. It closely follows the November 18, 2016 release of the Harry Potter prequel, *Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them*. Definitely for discriminating moviegoers who, like myself, find the inanely stereotypical Star Wars cowboysin-space melodramas a colossal bore. May the true Force - quality entertainment - always be with us.
