I read some good non-mystery fiction, but not as much. I do like to read about true crimes, especially ones that are historical. It gives me a chance to learn about another time period. Biographies do the same thing.

I was struck by something they all had in common. Where their children were concerned, each group isolated them from outside influences and limited their education. Each group indoctrinated their kids with their religious beliefs, but didn't give them basic knowledge. At age 16, the author of the Scientology book had an opportunity to leave but stayed because she knew that she would never be able to fit into public school.

What I took away from this is that education = freedom. The fact that I can read whatever I want, and not read what I choose not to is such a gift. I recommend that you exercise your freedom and read anything you want, just read!

Books: How Do You Succeed When Some People Don't Want You To?

Subtlety, balance, and confidence in your own abilities. *Lean In* is a book I am recommending to both males and females. When women and girls are not respected as competent individuals, it can be annoying or worse for men and boys.

Layla, whose name means "dark beauty", could not get her father's permission to marry the man she loved, Majnun the poet. Women matter to men, and so Majnun died of a broken heart. Listen to the original "Layla" by Eric Clapton and Jim Gordon, with guitar contribution by the late, great Duane Allman, and wonder what Pattie Boyd had to do with things.

But what would happen if men lost control? How would society be destroyed if women had rights? The Egyptian Muslim Brotherhood spells this out on their website http://www.ikhwanweb.com/article.php?id=30731 There are Catholic nuns who feel constrained by the church, and other women who feel limited by fundamentalists. And just remember *The Stepford Wives*.

Sheryl Sandberg discusses the psychology of women's success and the sociological factors in her book, *Lean In / Women, Work, and the Will to Lead.* While *Lean In* is very well integrated, the chapter headings actually describe what is in each chapter: The Leadership Gap: What Would You Be If You Weren't Afraid? It's a Jungle Gym, Not a Ladder; Are You My Mentor? Seek and Speak Your Truth; Don't Leave Before You Leave; Make Your Partner a Real Partner; The Myth of Doing It All; Let's Start Talking About It; Working Together Toward Equality.

She doesn't mention that TED is an organization whose initials stand for technology, education, and design, but it is of significance that comes up often.

If you are a penniless sitar player or some other man or boy who could die of a broken heart, I recommend you read this book. Would I recommend to my sister that she read this book? I already did.

Central Indiana Mensa ExCom Minutes 2/26/13

The The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held at Midwest Internet on Tuesday, Feb. 26, 2013.

LocSec Jan Pfeil Doyle called the meeting to order at 7:15 p.m. Members present included: Dave Culp, Jan Pfeil Doyle, Teresa Gregory, Ann Hake, Jean Rodgers, Karen Steilberger, Karen Wilczewski, Bob Zdanky, and Karen Zwick. Guests: David Bonner, Petra Ritchie, Christine Turo-Shields, and Sarah. David Bonner introduced Sarah to the ExCom as the head of the Youth Committee (Y-Com).

The committee reviewed the treasurer's report for the past two months, supplied by Past Treasurer **Alan Schmidt**. The balance as of 2/26/13 is \$20,732.87. The accounting for the recent RG has not been completed yet. Ann Hake made a motion to accept the treasurer's report, Teresa Gregory seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The minutes of the January ExCom meeting were reviewed and corrected. Ann Hake moved that the corrected minutes be accepted, Karen Wilczewski seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The membership report shows 3 new members, 10 reinstating members, 0 renewing members, 4 move-in members, 1 offer of membership, and 89 prospects. The number of prospects is much higher than usual because of the recent national promotion where the on-line home test was offered at no charge.

Old Business

RG: Teresa Gregory reported that the attendance at the RG was 69. The monetary loss will not be as much as anticipated thanks to savings on hotel, equipment, and presenter costs. The hotel is on board to have us back again next year. Jan Pfeil Doyle commended Teresa for the wonderful job she did chairing the RG. Christine Turo-Shields suggested that there be communication with the youth group for future RGs so that youth members can attend just the child-appropriate segments like the science presentation.

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Bank account: Karen Zwick will become a signatory on the bank account on Feb. 27.

Monthly meeting location: David Bonner said that the Todd Academy is in the process of purchasing a building. He, Jan, and Teresa will visit the site to assess its suitability as a meeting site for our group. Petra Ritchie recommended that any agreement with the academy be in writing, and the ExCom members agreed.

New Business

Youth: Sarah told the ExCom about the recent meeting of the Youth Committee. The five Y-Com members discussed ideas for projects and events and for raising funds to finance them. They assessed the general interests of the youth members, which include technology, nature activities, social activities within peer age groups. They have several ideas for activities, projects, and SIGs. They also plan to put together an annual calendar and use various media, including MIND, for publicizing their activities. David Bonner said the Family Program's Web site was recently updated and includes a blog. He would like the youth group's calendar to be included with our general calendar. Christine Turo-Shields said that the National Association for Gifted Children will hold its annual convention in Indianapolis from November 6-10, 2013. Possibly we could have a Mensa booth there.

Culture Quest: Jan Pfeil Doyle said the team list is due to National at the end of March. A few members have expressed an interest in participating.

Testing: Teresa Gregory reported on the most recent test, which she proctored at **Steve Merchant**'s request. There were 8 test-takers, only one of whom had participated in the recent free on-line test promotion.

Outdoor Gathering: Jan Pfeil Doyle said that Teresa Gregory will chair the OG, which is May 17-19. ExCom members and others will help as needed. **Cyndi Kuyper** has reserved the site.

There being no other business, Dave Culp made a motion to adjourn the

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meeting. Jean Rodgers seconded the motion. The motion carried, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:25 p.m.


