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Book Review

The Kids are Smart Enough, So What's the Problem? by Richard W. Garrett A Businessman's Perspective on Educational Reform and the Teacher Crises. © 2017

Learning and teaching in the nation's schools is being sabotaged by a small group of disruptive students in almost every class. Teachers are being prevented *Continued on next page*

from teaching and willing students are unable to learn while behavioral problems are dealt with day after day, taking an inordinate amount of time away from the actual subject matter.

The frustration of able teachers leads them to leave the profession. Word has gotten out, so fewer young people are going to college to get an education degree. The teacher shortage, already here in many places, is looming large on the horizon across the country.

Giving schools grades points to the problem but does not solve it. Giving teachers "incentive pay" does not solve the problem either, since teachers enter the profession, not to get rich, but to change lives. Handing schools over the for-profit organizations does not resolve the issue but costs the community valuable resources. Turning public schools into "charter schools" has been shown statistically to be useless, if not harmful. Finally, political teacher-bashing is counterproductive.

This lack of successful education of a large portion of the next generation will handicap the economy and social fabric of our country going forth. Garrett points to a viable solution that does not merely punish misbehaving students but works to reorient them while allowing eager peers and teachers to continue their education process uninterrupted. He provides several examples of schools that work, and the values taught there which should be part of every academic process, but especially if those values (which he repeatedly refers to collectively as character and grit) are not taught in the home.

Members of Central Indiana Mensa will recognize many names and places, as Garrett draws heavily on data from Indiana to support his point, but also looks to educational experts whose own publications are available to readers interested in pursuing the ideas. I also refer you to Garrett's website <u>http://www.elevateteachers.org/</u>

While the book sorely lacked a good editor and is extremely repetitive (100 pages instead of 149 would have been sufficient to get the points across but would not justify the high price of the book) Garrett has a valuable message. Garrett's lectures on the topic do not struggle with these issues, but rather are clear and riveting.

Catacombs Tour!

Discover the Secrets of the City Market on a Tour of the Catacombs March 17, 2018 at 10:00 a.m.

A vast expanse of brick barrel arches, the catacombs are all that remain of Tomlinson Hall, which burned in 1958 and was torn down by the city. Visitors will see the huge limestone pillars that supported the hall, explore the network of arches, and learn the history of the underground labyrinth, which includes its use as a storage facility during the flood of 1913, and a refuge for the city's homeless during the bitterest winters.



One of the nice things about your Mensa membership is that you can easily manage what you are sent, how you get it, and what information you want to disclose to others. For example, I elect to:

Receive only the on-line version of my Local Group newsletter. I get it quicker, it's in full color, and we don't have to spend money printing and mailing me a copy. For the same reasons, I also get my election ballots electronically.



Receive a hard copy of the Mensa Bulletin, even though I often read it on-line. I also volunteer as an admission test Proctor. I hope that giving test candidates a Bulletin will help convince them to join if they qualify.

Disclose my e-mail and phone in case people want to contact me about something. I also allow my Local Group to contact me via e-mail or phone.

Show my picture, so people will know who I am. It's only one year old. Really.

Not disclose my birthday. It's probably doesn't matter, but I do worry about identity theft.

Not allow Mensa's partners to contact me about promotions.

Receive Mensa Brainwave, a weekly summary of news often of interest to Mensa members. I usually find something to read every week.

You may not have ever changed your preferences from the defaults. If that's working for you, great; otherwise, doing a quick review may improve your member experience. Simply log on to the web site and navigate to My Mensa -> My Profile. There are a lot of options, but definitely check out the "My Communication Preferences" section. You can subscribe to Mensa Brainwave under Read -> Brainwave.

Further Details Behind Increases

The primary expense that has increased for the Monthly Gatherings is the cost of the meeting facility. In past years, we were able to rent the use of less expensive facilities for \$25 - \$35 per month. Those facilities are no longer available and/or cannot accommodate the average number of attendees.

Our current facility at All Souls Unitarian church provides adequate space and kitchen facilities and costs \$137.75 per month. When the current rental agreement expires in April 2018, we hope to further reduce that amount by limiting the time rented from six to four hours (7 - 11 pm).

Books On The Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Title: The Quartet: Orchestrating the Second American Revolution, 1783-1789 **Author:** Joseph J. Ellis **Year:** 2015



Book Description: There is a long tradition among Americans of celebrating July 4, 1776, as the date of

the singular revolution that liberated Americans from British rule and gave birth to the United States as a nation. However, according to Pulitzer Prize-winning historian Joseph J. Ellis, this notion has as much substance as Yankee Doodle's fabled macaroni, because it does not begin to tell the complete story. In *The*

Quartet, his scholarly yet freshly provocative account, Ellis makes a cogent, thoroughly researched case for the existence of a second American revolution the formation of a truly unified national government through the creation and ratification of the Constitution of the United States - without which the first revolution could not have been realized and sustained. He credits four men in particular as the key players in this drama of nascent nationhood: George Washington, James Madison, John Jay, and Alexander Hamilton. In addition to presenting a richly detailed chain of events, starting with the formulation of the unwieldy and ineffectual Articles of Confederation and culminating in the establishment of the more robust Constitutional government, the author profiles the four founders, describing each man's personal background and the attributes that made him a uniquely qualified advocate for a consolidated America. The book also pays tribute to the major supporting players - Robert Morris, Gouverneur Morris, and Thomas Jefferson - and includes in its appendices the Articles of Confederation and the original versions of the Constitution of the United States (1787) and the Bill of Rights (1791).

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how? This book was recommended to me by my sister-inlaw, Rhonda, during her last visit to Indiana and our customary stop at the local Barnes and Noble. Like myself, she is an avid consumer of historical literature and is inclined to keep an open mind regarding revisionist interpretations of our cultural heritage. We especially appreciate the admonition the author delivers throughout the book against judging prominent eighteenth century citizens according to twenty-first-century sensibilities (see the excerpt below). The four subjects of *The Quartet* should be commemorated for their roles in establishing an enduring democratic government based on a document that clearly delineates laws and institutions, and yet allows for growth and change - no petty achievement, certainly. So, if you please, folks, let those public statues stand proudly!

Who should definitely read this book? Why? Amateur and professional historians will enjoy this literary excursion outside of the school-textbook box. As *The Quartet* is as much a character study as a catalog of events, it should also appeal to readers with a taste for the theatrical.

How long might it take to read this book? A riveting read and a mere 220 pages in length, *The Quartet* should not tax anyone's schedule, and can be completed in 2 or 3 days.

Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote: "There is little doubt that the lost world of the founding was a more explicitly racist world than our own. The founders were truly remarkable for their ability to imagine a nation-size republic and a political framework that *Continued on next page*

insisted on the separation of church and state, both of which were unprecedented social experiments that succeeded. But neither they nor the vast majority of white Americans were capable of imagining a biracial society. (Neither, for that matter, was such a staunch opponent of slavery as Harriet Beecher Stowe, who provided an appendix at the end of Uncle Tom's Cabin that described her plan for deporting all the freed slaves back to Africa.) We need to remind ourselves that racial integration in the United States was a mid-twentieth-century idea that few if any of the founders could have comprehended. Imposing our racial agenda on them is politically correct but historical irresponsible."

Additional Remarks: In light of what *The Quartet* has revealed about the tandem American revolutions, and how closely they complemented one another, I would propose that we add another summer holiday (we can never have too many of those, right?): June 21. On that day in 1788, New Hampshire, the last of the nine states required to ratify the Constitution, did so, to the benefit of all American citizens. And as we celebrate Constitution Day, let's add a prayer that our form of government based on that transformative document endures for generations to come. Amen!

ExCom in Action (From the March 1993 MIND)

Minutes of Friday, December 11, 1992 Meeting

Present: Rick Barbrick, Roger Larson, George Dunn, Diane Seaman, Karen Bauerschmidt, Karen Wilczewski, Gordon Lamb, and Marion Harcourt. Absent: Richard DeLiberty

The Executive committee of Indianapolis Mensa met and called regular session on Friday, December 11, 1992, at the home of Karen Bauerschmidt. The meeting was called to order at 6:55 pm by Local Secretary Rick Barbrick.

To date, a new monthly meeting place has not been found. Rick announced that the ExCom meeting and monthly meeting will again be conducted at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church on the east side of Indianapolis.

Regarding the ombudsman position, Rick contacted National for information. He then discussed the new Indianapolis Mensa Phone -54 MENSA, which is a voice mail system that saves the group substantial dollars over the former phone line. Grace Falvey will work with Indiana Bell to get the system up. Lois Kinneman will monitor calls from the new Mensa phone line.

Rick then reported receiving 71 registrations for the 1993 RG.

Karen Bauerschmidt reported four new members joining Mensa. She is also preparing new member packets and will draft a letter to members who are new to Indianapolis Mensa but were members of the group elsewhere. *Continued on next page*

As Treasurer, Diane Seaman reported \$520 in the checking account with no additional support from National until January 1, 1993.

Karen B. moved to explore fund-raising efforts outside the RG at a future meeting. She said Adren Yates was a good person to discuss the project with. This would help relieve the strain on the general checking account. Gordon seconded the motion and the ExCom passed it unanimously.

Diane Seaman suggested accepting advertising in the MIND or transferring funds from the RG account into the general fund as another means of relieving financial pressures. She then suggested establishing guidelines on how to spend the group's money. Karen B. moved that \$500 be transferred from the RG account and deposited into the general account. Marion Harcourt seconded and the motion was unanimously passed.

Karen B. then moved that each ExCom member prepare a proposed preliminary expense budget for 1993 and asked them to document actual expenses incurred. ExCom members responsible for non-ExCom members who incur expenses were asked to bring those budgets to the next meeting as well. When these are turned in, Diane will project 1993 expenses to the ExCom. The motion was seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Diane then requested an annual audit of the Mensa books. The ExCom needs to recruit someone to conduct the audit, preferably a CPA or bookkeeper. Rick will announce this in his column in the February MIND.

Discussion then moved to scholarship funds. Karen B. agreed to research what other chapters do to distribute these funds, while Gordon Lamb moved to table discussion of scholarship funds until Grace Falvey could attend the meeting and bring the ExCom up to date on the status of the funds. Karen B. seconded the motion, and it was unanimously passed by the ExCom.

As Volunteer Coordinator, Sandy Sheehan will recruit volunteers to take money at the door during the monthly meetings.

Gordon then brought up conducting monthly meetings alternately between Fridays and Saturdays. He then moved that discussion be tabled until a permanent site has been established for the meetings. Roger Larson seconded and the ExCom passed the motion unanimously.

After some discussion, Gordon moved to dissolve the MIND liaison position. Karen B. seconded and it was unanimously passed.


The next ExCom meeting was set for Friday, January 8, 1993, at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church starting at 6:30 pm.
