



Jon's Journal - News for Region 4

I'm Out of the Closet, And It's Fun!

A couple of years back, the chair of Chicago's Rainbow SIG asked the group's members whether they were more in the closet about being gay or about being in Mensa. I don't know what the response was, but I'm guessing it might be Mensa. As reported before in this column, most people tell their families they belong to Mensa, but fewer than 60% have told their friends, and it's around a third for coworkers.



I came out about being in Mensa soon after joining. I thought it might help me advance my career. I can't say that it did, but it didn't seem to hurt either. Some people I knew at work later joined Mensa, and I'm hoping I had something to do with that.

Today I embrace all that Mensa has to offer. I attend Annual and Regional Gatherings; I go to monthly meetings. My wife and I just returned from the Minnesota State Fair, where Minnesota Mensa graciously let us help staff their booth for a couple of days.



Nearly two-thirds of lapsed members cite unappealing Local Group activities as a reason for not renewing. Yet Mensa has a lot to offer. Activities may not be in your back yard, but if you can travel a bit you'll find we do a lot. Besides all the lunches and dinners, I've gone on tours (Fermilab, Exelon's nuclear power plant in Clinton, the

Yerkes observatory), cultural events (opera), sports (minor league baseball, bowling), lectures (everything from cybersecurity to cued speech), and more.

If you can't find something to do in your local group, look at what's happening in neighboring groups. You can read all their newsletters on the https://us.mensa.org site under "Read". Better yet, find something you want to do and volunteer to host it for other members. It's not complicated: make reservations if needed, publish the event in your newsletter, and show up a bit early to welcome others. It helps to have an owl or something so people can find you. Not every event will succeed, but many will. If something doesn't, find something else to do; if something does, do it again.

Books On The Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Title: *Meet Me at the Museum* **Author:** Anne Youngson

Year: 2018

Book Description: *Meet Me at the Museum*, British neophyte author Anne Youngson's magnificent debut novel, brings the tradition of



such epistolary fiction classics as Helene Hanff's 84, Charing Cross Road and Miklos Laszlo's Parfumerie (and its American adaptation, The Shop Around the Corner) into the twenty-first century. The story commences in a purely scholarly vein: with Seamus Heaney's poetic paean to the ancient remains of the Danish Tollund Man, and Professor Glob's dedication to his young archaeology students in his 1969 book, The Bog People. The plot, as it were, quickly fast-Continued on next page

forwards five decades to a farm in East Anglia, England, the residence of Tina Hopgood, one of the female students who, upon the death of her classmate and dearest friend, seeks solace through a connection with the Professor and the primeval human artifact that the two women had always hoped to see firsthand (see excerpt below). She is rewarded with a thoughtful reply to her first letter by the current curator of the Silkeborg Museum, Anders Larson, who informs her that Professor Glob is long dead, and encourages her to travel to Denmark and visit his museum at her earliest convenience. The remainder of the book is comprised of correspondence between Tina and Anders that spans sixteen months. Their relationship deepens with the passage of time, as each gains from the other what has been missing from their separate lives. Through their candid, insightful letters, they discuss such topics as local culture, poetry, music, fashion, and agriculture, and share personal views on birth, death, marriage, parenthood, love, betrayal... and hope. This expertly crafted melding of two distinct personalities runs the emotional gamut from delight to despair, and beautifully confirms the observation made by Socrates decades before the Tollund Man first appeared on earth: the unexamined life is not worth living.

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how? This book brings to mind my thirty-plus-year, remote communication with a friend whom I met when we were both Toastmasters in San Diego. It was he who encouraged my initial Mensa membership, at which time I made an unofficial wager with him that I lacked the intelligence to qualify (as all of you know, I lost the bet). Even though we have not seen each other for more than three decades, our exchange of letters is still stimulating. I look forward to finally meeting up with him when my husband and I make our delayed retirement trip in December. I guess it can be said that *Meet Me at the Museum* is also, in essence, a "never too late" message for us seniors.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? This book will indubitably appeal more to the artists than to the "techies" among us, as it is primarily a potent love story with fully developed, engaging characters, intermixed with some intriguing archaeological and cultural facts that may attract social scientists.

How long might it take to read this book? I recommend setting aside a day of leisure for continuous reading, rather than taking a fragmentary approach (pausing between letters), to preserve the continuity of the narrative. I guarantee that this extra time investment will be richly rewarded.

Although we have never met, you dedicated a book to me once; to me, thirteen of my schoolmates, and your daughter. This was more than fifty years ago, when I was young. And now I am not. This business, of being no longer young, is occupying much of my mind these days and I am writing to you to see if you can help me make sense of some of the thoughts that occur to me. Or maybe I am hoping that just writing will make sense of them, because I have little expectation that you will reply. For all I know, you may be dead.

One of these thoughts is about plans never fulfilled. You know what I mean - if you are still alive you must be a very old man by now and it must have occurred to you that what you thought would happen, when you were young, never did. For example, you might have promised yourself you would try a sport or a hobby or an art or a craft. And now you find you have lost the physical dexterity or stamina to take it up. There will be reasons why you never did but none of them is good enough. None of them is the clincher. You cannot say: I planned to take up oil painting but I couldn't because I turned out to be allergic to a chemical in the paint. It is just that life goes on from day to day and that one moment never arrives. In my case, I promised myself I would travel to Denmark and visit the Tollund Man. And I have not. I know, from the book you dedicated to me, that only his head is preserved, not his beautiful hands and feet. But his face is enough. His face, as it appears on the cover of your book, is pinned up on my wall, I see it every day. Every day I am reminded of his serenity, his dignity, his look of wisdom and resignation. It is like the face of my grandmother, who was dear to me. I still live in East Anglia, and how far is it to the Silkeborg Museum? Six hundred miles as the crow flies? As far as Edinburgh and back. I have been to Edinburgh and back...

The truth is, I do want to be special. I want there to be significance in the connection made between you and me in 1964 and links back to the man buried in the bog two thousand years ago. I am not very coherent. Please do not bother to reply if you think I do not justify your time.

Central Indiana Mensa ExCom 6/19/18

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held at Midwest Internet on Tuesday, June 19, 2018.

LocSec Jan Pfeil Doyle called the meeting to order at 6:46 pm. Members present were Jon Applegate, Ethan Blocher-Smith, Jan Pfeil Doyle, Ann Hake, Diane O'Brien, Karen Wilczewski, Kurt Williams, Bob Zdanky, and Karen Zwick. Absent: none.

Guests: Teresa Gregory, Petra Ritchie.

The committee reviewed the minutes of the May 2018 ExCom meeting. Karen Zwick moved that the minutes be accepted. Karen Wilczewski seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The committee reviewed the Treasurer's report. Ann Hake moved that the Treasurer's report be accepted as presented. Kurt Williams seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

A membership report was compiled by Jan Pfeil Doyle based upon the information available as of 5/31/2018 from American Mensa: 477 members, 0 new, 2 rejoins, 1 movein, and 11 prospects.

Old Business

2018 Annual Gathering: Planning continues steadily – the countdown clock shows 14 days until July 4th.

As a result of the discussion regarding contacting lapsed members at last month's ExCom meeting, emails were sent to 49 lapsed members inviting them to renew their memberships and to join us for the AG in Indianapolis.

New Business

Given that the Outdoor Gathering (OG) did not take place this year in order to allow everyone to concentrate on planning for the AG, discussion ensued regarding whether people wished to restart it in the coming year. The consensus was positive, with a target date of May 17-19, 2019 in the same location as previously in Versailles, IN. Kurt Williams moved that this be done; Bob Zdanky seconded the motion, and the motion was carried. Karen Zwick volunteered to call the campground to secure reservations.

In the same vein, the CIM regional Gathering (RG) was also skipped in 2018. Discussion ensued regarding resuming this next year, recognizing that our prior venue has changed ownership and may no longer be available to us. A period of brainstorming took place regarding potential other locations or times, partnering with other groups, or perhaps alternating years with other nearby groups. The discussion was ultimately tabled until after AG.


