



Jon's Journal - News for Region 4

Board of Directors (AMC) Update—Longer Term of Service? *Jon Gruebele, RVC4*

The quarterly AMC meeting was held December 7th in Elk Grove Village, IL, not far from O'Hare. Despite a relatively short agenda, it went well into the afternoon with discussions on financials, liability, risk, the Mensa Foundation, and strategy. My thanks go to the members who attended the meeting, and the others who read the mini-minutes and reports or listened to the audio recording posted on-line.



Our most detailed discussion centered around changing our elected officers' terms from 2 to 3 years. Since this

is a bylaws change, first the AMC would vote to pass the measure to the membership, then members would vote on it at our next election in April, 2021. This measure was proposed because the International election cycle was recently changed from 2 to 3 years. If approved, American Mensa's election schedule would then match International's.

When I posted about this in our Region 4 Facebook group before the meeting, I got mixed feedback. Some were in favor, others against, and some weren't sure. To summarize the various viewpoints:

Con

- Two years is long enough. We need a constantly changing board, enthusiastically bringing in new ideas.
- We only see AMC members when they're campaigning. If we lengthen their terms, we'll see them even less frequently.
- If we get a bad AMC member in office, it'll be an extra year before we can get rid of him or her (absent a recall election)
- We could have fewer members running for office if they must commit to a longer term
- Sometimes RVCs resign for various reasons. Typically, they are replaced by an appointed "Regional Coordinator" who can do everything an RVC can do but doesn't have a vote on the AMC. A 3year term could mean a longer time for a Region to go without a voting representative.

Pro

- Reduced cost for fewer elections. Today we have 3 elections every 6 years. If this doesn't pass, we'll have 4 including International's; if it does, we'll have only 2.
- There's a big learning curve to becoming an effective AMC member. Today, a new AMC officer spends a year or so figuring out the job and

(for RVCs) building relationships with their local groups. Six months later they're running for re-election. There's no time to be effective.

- Some members are annoyed by the e-mails and social media chatter that accompany elections. Fewer elections might drive more interest and better participation.
- We'd get more new board members with 3-year terms. That's enough time to accomplish what a new officer wants, so there'd be fewer officers seeking re-election.

In the end, I voted with the majority to pass this proposal to our members for their consideration. I felt the cost savings and learning curve arguments were compelling.


Title: Click Here to Kill Everybody: Security and Survival in a Hyper-

Connected World

Publisher: W. W. Norton & Company

Year: 2018

Book description (max. 5 sentences): The Internet of Things offers great promise but also threats. By taking advantage of technological ease of controlling our lives, we also are exposed to manipulations of those who do not have our best interests in mind, but rather their own. Malevolent actors come in many flavors: individual criminals, large international criminal bands, corporations, governments both foreign and domestic. The author, who works at both IBM Security and Harvard University, describes the many dangers that an interconnected environment contains. It is very disturbing reading. He narrates incidents that have occurred and extrapolates likely future scenarios. He also discusses remedies for the



cyberthreats that careless use of connectivity brings and at the same time, lays out all the current things in our political and economic world that work against these solutions.

Has this book changed the way you think? your attitude towards life? even your life itself? If so, how? It has confirmed my skepticism about the Internet of Things. However, I know that I am already surrounded by it and with each new purchase of equipment, I will be drawn deeper into it.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? Everyone with a computer in their possession, that is everyone with a mobile phone, an automobile younger than a couple of decades, an alarm system, that is everyone living in the 21st century.

How long might it take to read the book? A week, especially if you read all the footnotes.

Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote: My pessimism arises more from the US's collective inability to imagine government as a force for good in the world. When I review the current Internet security landscape, I see an environment shaped by corporate decisions to maximize profits and government abdication of its regulatory role to protect all citizens. I see a populace mesmerized by the frankly amazing capabilities of these new networked technologies, and negligent in considering the stupendously profound social repercussions of it all. Our current level of security is determined by the market, and I know – and hopefully have demonstrated – that it will be inadequate for the Internet+. (p.219) Despite the pessimistic tone of much of this book, I am optimistic about cybersecurity in the long term. Eventually, we will solve this. (p. 220)

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held at Midwest Internet on Tuesday, November 19, 2019.

LocSec Teresa Gregory called the meeting to order at 7:13 pm. Members present were Vicki Adang, Jan Pfeil Doyle, Teresa Gregory, Ann Hake, Pat Milligan, Kurt Williams, and Bob Zdanky. Absent: none. Guest: Basil Vareldzis

The committee reviewed the minutes of the October 2019 ExCom meeting. Kurt Williams moved that the minutes be accepted. Jan Pfeil Doyle seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The committee reviewed the Treasurer's report for October 2019. Ann Hake moved that the report be accepted. Vicki Adang seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

A membership report was compiled by Teresa Gregory based upon the information available as of 10/31/2019 from American Mensa: 498 members, 1 new, 1 movein, 2 rejoins, and 9 prospects. Seven candidates were tested in two test sessions.

Old Business

Regional Gathering (RG) – will take place January 24-26, 2020. Teresa promoted the gathering at WeeM and will promote at it at the Cincinnati RG. The comedy troupe "The Authors" will perform on Saturday night. Registration is available on EventBrite.

Outdoor Gathering (OG) – will take place the last weekend of May (May 29-31, 2020) in Versailles State Park. It is noted no animals and no unaccompanied minors are permitted. Registration is available on EventBrite.

New Business

January admission testing is \$39.99. All local groups will automatically be given MensaConnect sites in 2020 but are permitted to opt out if they choose. After discussion, the Committee agreed to opt out for now. Ann Hake made the motion and Kurt Williams seconded, and the motion was carried.

It was also reported that the cost for the Meetup subscription will be going up. Although it has been the general consensus that this has been a valuable tool for communication and recruitment, it was felt that it would be useful to gather data to see if this is true given the impending price increase. Bob Zdanky and Pat Milligan will prepare a usage report to help evaluate whether the account should be continued.

Additional discussion took place regarding potential activities around Gen Con, such as sponsoring a meetup at a local bar or restaurant, or providing a type of identifying tag that attendees can use to find each other (similar to the flag pins of yesteryear). Discussions will continue.

There being no other business, Ann Hake moved that the meeting be adjourned. Kurt Williams seconded the motion. The motion was carried and the meeting was adjourned at 8:13 pm.


