

Jon's Journal – News for Region 4 Rights, Opinions, and Facebook—What To Do? Jon Gruebele. RVC4

As I write this at the end of June, hundreds of social media posts and e-mails have reached the national office and Board of Directors (AMC). These relate to both the AMC's statement on racism and motions for our <u>July 11 AMC</u> meeting.

In 1986 and again in 1998, the AMC affirmed, "bigotry and prejudice are antithetical to the nature of American Mensa". In response to George Floyd's homicide, the AMC reinforced this with a message to our members. Some complained the statement violated our constitution's prohibition against Mensa expressing opinions or having



any "ideological, philosophical, political, or religious affiliations."

This reminded me of the uproar after Chicago's Rainbow SIG marched in the 2015 Chicago Pride Parade. This put Mensa's name in front of around one million attendees, and I proudly marched with them. While the event had been planned for months, it was held just two days after the Supreme Court decided the 14th Amendment allowed same-sex couples to marry. Despite the ensuing complaints about Mensa "expressing opinions", it was determined the SIG did nothing wrong, and they've marched in every parade since.

It is relatively rare for the AMC to get compliments. Yet after our statement on racism, we got lots of compliments – perhaps as many people were supportive as those sending complaints. Many felt racism isn't an "opinion"; it's a violation of fundamental human rights.

I personally supported sending a statement, although I can't claim credit for writing it. I recommended we include some concrete actions to back up our words. Let's face it: our organization lacks diversity. We need to improve. Unfortunately, improvements are still very much "TBD".

The July 11th AMC meeting agenda has motions to remove the "American Mensa" name from our Facebook Firehouse and Hospitality groups. We will also discuss a Code of Conduct, which might cover both on-line and in-person interactions if adopted at a future meeting. While social media posts that could be considered racist, sexist, ageist, or any other "ist" may be protected by free speech, they also represent a reputational risk to Mensa. We somehow need to nurture the free exchange of opinions – including those with which we personally disagree – without crossing the line into abuse. That won't be easy to define or implement.

As I have a close relative who works for Facebook, I will be recusing myself from the discussion and votes on the Firehouse and Hospitality motions. That may not be strictly required, but American Mensa officially approved having these groups on Facebook, and that generates advertising revenue. As a Facebook employee, my relative participates in that revenue stream through employment, bonuses, and stock incentives. By recusing myself, I will help ensure these decisions will be made without impropriety on my part.

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held virtually via Zoom on Tuesday, June 16, 2020.

LocSec Teresa Gregory called the meeting to order at 7:10 pm.

Members present: Vicki Adang, Jan Pfeil Doyle, Teresa Gregory, Ann Hake, Pat Milligan, Kurt Williams, and Bob Zdanky.

Guest: Jon Applegate (Regional Ombudsman).

The committee reviewed the minutes of the May 2020 ExCom meeting. Kurt Williams moved that the minutes be accepted as amended. Jan Pfeil Doyle seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The committee reviewed the Treasurer's report for May 2020. Ann Hake moved that the report be accepted as amended. Vicki Adang seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

A membership report was compiled by Teresa Gregory based upon the information available as of 5/31/2020 from American Mensa: 448 members, 0 new, 0 movein, 4 rejoins, and 7 prospects. No candidates were tested due to the COVID-19 restrictions.

Old Business

Regional Gathering (RG) – preliminary planning is beginning for the 2021 RG.

Outdoor Gathering (OG) – preliminary planning is beginning for the 2021 OG. The weekend of May 14-16, 2021 has been reserved at Versailles State Park and a deposit has been made. This deposit is 50% refundable if we cancel more than 90 days before the event, and 25% refundable if we cancel 90 days or fewer before the event.

Nominating Committee – Karen Guse (chair) and the committee members are developing a slate of nominees for the upcoming election.

New Business

It was noted that longtime CIM Life Member Richard (Bruce) Bakemeier passed away recently. A contribution will be made in his name to the John Matthews CIM Scholarship fund, and his passing will be noted in the MIND.

ExCom Member Vicki Adang announced that she will be relocating to Cincinnati in the near future. We at CIM will be very sorry to see her depart but wish her well in her future endeavors, and hope to see her frequently at many *Continued on next page*

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Mensa events. She will continue to serve out the remainder of her ExCom term.

The CIM MeetUp account has been renewed for another 6 months.

The National office has been providing guidance regarding Mensa meetings and activities with regard to COVID-19 via Mensa Connect. The information was discussed, and ideas brainstormed, with an emphasis on continued safety.

There being no other business, Kurt Williams moved that the meeting be adjourned. Ann Hake seconded the motion. The motion was carried, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:33 pm.

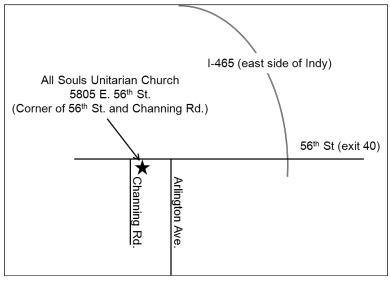
