Great Wall of China

This 13,000-mile series of stone walls is the crowning monumental achievement of mankind. I walked part of that massive wall and can confirm that the battlements and garrison towers project an aura of immense power. It is easy to imagine the impression they must have had upon bands of Gobi Desert nomads.

Building materials varied with whatever natural resources were available at a given location. A "typical" section might have been built from tamped soil, stone slabs, and rock overlayed with a brick facade. The structure's average measurements are 21 feet wide at the base, 16 feet wide on top, and 33 feet high.

Initial construction began around 700 B.C. Five hundred years later, linking various segments and the building of more courses began in earnest. Thereafter, each successive emperor expanded and improved existing segments. Extensive expansions and improvements were made throughout the Ming Dynasty (1368-1644 A.D.) and later. Recently the focus has been on repairing damage caused by Red Guards during the Cultural Revolution, and by brick-and-stone-stealing farmers throughout the ages.

Books on the Runway


Title: Sandy Hook: An American Tragedy and the Battle for Truth

Publisher: Dutton/Penguin Random House LLC

Year: 2022

Book Description: During the past decade, in the aftermath of a horrific school shooting, Sandy Hook Elementary School has been transformed from a hallmark of idyllic suburban living to a symbol of mass murder. Sandy Hook is journalist Elizabeth Williamson's exploration of the actual event and its effect on various players - good and bad - in this tragedy that has become an all-too-familiar American news theme.

The author commences her narrative with a comprehensive, minute-by-minute account of the violent confrontation that left twenty first graders and



six educators dead and ended with the mentally- deranged shooter's suicide. But the anguish continues for the victims' families as, what seems to be typical of our current toxic political environment, two camps emerge surrounding the mass murders: conspiracy theorists who claim that the school shooting was faked in order to advance an anti-firearms agenda; and a courageous group of Sandy Hook survivors fighting against personal harassment and the promulgation of false narratives via social media outlets. Williamson candidly and passionately chronicles the sadistic behavior of Infowars' bombastic, amoral leader, Alex Jones, and his more vocal supporters (including, shamefully for American higher education, several college professors with PhDs); and the powerfully heroic actions of the survivors, peacefully counter- attacking the hoaxers' pernicious physical and verbal assaults by establishing outreach organizations and winning defamation lawsuits against the conspiracists. Painstakingly researched through countless interviews from both sides of the political divide and access to a trove of official documents and presented in a lyrical narrative style that is both rational and fervent, Sandy Hook is a lesson on the promotion of responsible journalism, and the power and perils of "free" speech.

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how?

Always sympathetic to the families of shooting victims, I was unaware of the extent and sources of personal abuse that are often visited upon these people, merely because they are perceived as a threat to the ideologies of certain fanatical groups. Sandy Hook provided me with a well-rounded perspective on overcoming adversity and some hope that sanity has not completely disappeared from American life despite the efforts of various domestic terrorists. I was also

gratified to learn that, according to a report in the April 29, 2022 edition of The Week, Alex Jones "is drowning in legal fees resulting from false claims about the 2012 Sandy Hook school shooting, forcing his media outlet Infowars and two other businesses to file for bankruptcy this week." You know what they say about karma, Mr. Jones...

Who should definitely read this book? Why? MIND readers will appreciate the relevance of this book to topics covered in other reviews: trust (Pete Buttigieg's appropriately titled volume), free speech (Dare to Speak by Suzanne Nossel), and human cognitive flaws (Why We're Wrong About Nearly Everything by Bobby Duffy, and Human Errors by Nathan E. Lents). Readers unfamiliar with the above-mentioned publications will nevertheless find Sandy Hook a worthwhile and informative – albeit disturbing - read, from a sociopolitical standpoint, at least.

How long might it take to read this book? The book is, at 446 pages - excluding the acknowledgments, notes, and index - rather lengthy, but will prove to be a riveting page-turner with numerous astonishing, if not completely unexpected, revelations. For the full import of the book's essential message, allow one week's reading time.

Lenny [father of massacre victim Noah Pozner] was chillingly prescient when he predicted nearly a decade ago that what the Sandy Hook families were enduring would become a feature of life in the digital age. The struggle to defend objective truth against people who consciously choose to deny or distort it has become a fight to defend our society, and democracy itself. The nature of conspiracy theorizing has changed, from relatively harmless speculation about the Bermuda Triangle or Bohemian Grove to sinister theories that place democratic governments at the center of dark plots to control, sicken, and murder their own citizens. These online accusations are now often invented and spread by demagogic leaders around the globe, who use social media platforms to undermine trust in the very institutions that keep the powerful in check elections and the courts, competing branches of government, and objective journalism. These political opportunists play to constituencies willing to relinquish objective truth for attractive, fantastical Deep State schemes in which political opponents are pedophiles and satanists, and society's most vulnerable morph into villains deserving vigilante justice. As the world saw during the Capitol insurrection on January 6, 2021, some believers in these myths have proved themselves increasingly willing to use violence. Societal chasms between adherents to truth and consumers of fantasy are widening, aided by those who deliberately manipulate social media channels and discourse. By the end of the second decade of this new century, foreign adversaries and domestic extremists, the traditional culprits, had been joined by a significant swath of the Republican Party.

Central Indiana Mensa ExCom 4/19/2022

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held virtually via Zoom on Tuesday, April 19, 2022. LocSec Teresa Gregory called the meeting to order at 7:18 pm.

Members present: Teresa Fisher, Teresa Gregory, Ann Hake, Nan Harvey, Kurt Williams, Bob Zdanky, and Matthew Zwick. Guests: Jon Applegate (Regional Ombudsman), Jan Pfeil Doyle, and Pat Milligan.

The committee reviewed the minutes of the March 2022 ExCom meeting. Kurt Williams moved that the minutes be accepted. Matt Zwick seconded the motion, and the motion was carried. The committee reviewed the Treasurer's report for March 2022. Ann Hake moved that the report be accepted. Nan Harvey seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

A membership report was compiled by Teresa Gregory based upon the information available as of 3/31/2022 from American Mensa: 494 members, 2 new, 1 movein, 2 rejoins, and 6 prospects. No candidates were tested.

Old Business

Monthly Gathering: Teresa Gregory has spoken further with the All Souls administration regarding returning to meeting in person for the Monthly Gathering. We still have a 3-month credit from before the pandemic; after that, there will be a rental agreement in which CIM will pay monthly. Either All Souls or CIM may terminate the agreement with 30 days' notice. For the time being, we will meet in Harris Hall while work on the HVAC system in the Beatty Room is being done.

Other Gatherings: Mensans Dining Out and Ham 'n' Eggs have resumed meeting in person, the Lunch Bunch will alternate meeting formats (virtual on the 1st Wednesday of the month and in person on the 3rd Wednesday), and the book group will continue meeting in hybrid format. Other opportunities for virtual meetings (for example, Sunday Social) will also continue.

Outdoor Gathering (OG): is scheduled for May 20-22, 2022, at Versailles State Park; reservations have been made and a deposit has been put down. We will plan to move forward with this event, but be prepared to cancel if circumstances dictate. The American Mensa National Covid policy will be observed. Prospective participants will be reminded that parking is limited and admission fees are per car, so carpooling is encouraged; children under age 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult; and no pets are permitted at the venue.

Registration is open for the 2022 Annual Gathering July 6-10 in Sparks, NV. Registration prices increased on January 3, 2022 (from \$219 to \$244) and on February 28 (to \$269); they will increase once more on May 31 (to \$299, the onsite registration rate.)

CultureQuest XXXIII will take place Sunday, April 24; two teams from CIM will participate.

The annual financial review mandated by our bylaws has been completed by Kurt Williams and presented in executive session. We have had below average financial

activity due to the pandemic, but our financial situation is sound. Ann Hake moved that the financial review report be accepted. Teresa Fisher seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

CIM ExCom elections are due to be held this September; formation of the Nominating Committee and the Election Committee continues. Karen Guse has agreed to chair the Nominating Committee.

New Business

There being no other business, Kurt Williams moved that the meeting be adjourned. Ann Hake seconded the motion. The motion was carried, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:29 pm.


