

Hadrian's Wall


Rome had managed a continuous 79-year presence in Britain when Emperor Hadrian ordered the creation of a sea-to-sea wall to guard against incessant raids by the fierce, blue-tattooed Celtic Picts. The 73-mile wall was begun in 122 A.D. and completed in 128 A.D. Reinforcement was accomplished by observation towers, stone garrison forts, and patrols between the towers and

forts. The wall served to separate Scotland from the Roman province of Britannia and remained the northernmost boundary of the entire Roman Empire for the next 300 years (with one brief exception).

In 142 A.D., fourteen years after Hadrian completed his wall, Roman Emperor Antonius Pius (r. 138 -161 A.D.) built another sea-to-sea wall at a narrower



point in Scotland 100 miles farther north. That 37-mile wall was completed in 154 A.D. The finished Antonine Wall, a structure consisting of trenches, mantraps, moats, stone forts, timber watchtowers, and

earthen walls, served as Rome's northernmost frontier boundary for only eight years. The legions abandoned it and withdrew to Hadrian's Wall in 162 A.D.

Voting Instructions

- 1. Remove, copy, or print out (for online readers) this ballot.
- 2. After you have marked your ballot, put it in an envelope with no identifying marks and seal it. This will be your inner envelope. An inner envelope with any identifying marks will be discarded.
- 3. Put this inner envelope in an outer envelope and seal it.
- 4. On the reverse side (or flap side) of the outer envelope put your name and membership number (see your Mensa Bulletin mailing label). If you cannot find your membership number, you may contact LocSec Teresa Gregory; she can look it up for you. Any outer envelope received without a name and membership number will be discarded.
- 5. Options for delivering your ballot:
 - A. Put a stamp on this outer envelope and mail it to Election Committee Chair Larry Marcus, 9941 Logan Ln, Fishers, IN 46037-9457. The envelope must be postmarked on or before September 2, 2022 to be counted; OR
 - B. Bring the larger envelope containing your ballot in a smaller sealed envelope to the September 9, 2022 monthly gathering and give it to a member of the election committee; OR
 - C. Blank ballots and envelopes will be available for voting at the September 9 monthly gathering.


Jon's Journal - News for Region 4

Books on the Runway

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Author: Randy Rainbow **Title:** *Playing With Myself* **Publisher:** St. Martin's Press

Year: 2022

Book Description: In the midst of the incessant bad news and the anguish that the lurid headlines engender, laughter is what keeps us sane - right?? Happily, during my latest trip to Barnes and Noble, I found my own comedy relief in the form of entertainer par excellence Randy Rainbow's delightful memoir, Playing with Myself. As engaging and hilarious as Randy's musical parodies that have graced the internet for the past decade, Playing with Myself showcases his heretofore unrealized talent as a raconteur, featuring



his high and low points as an up-and-coming comedic performer: his upbringing within a musically gifted but dysfunctional family; his struggle with homophobic classroom bullies and with his own extreme shyness and insecurity; his frequently frustrating efforts to find his professional niche while working at menial jobs in order to survive; the step-by-step crafting of his internet persona and his exhilaration at the viewing public's enthusiastic response; and finally, his richly rewarding friendships with such show business luminaries as Stephen Sondheim, Carol Burnett, RuPaul, Patti LuPone, and, incredibly (gasp), Barbra Streisand! As a bonus, he throws in some fun (and, at times, sobering) facts about his reasons for feeling indebted to Mel Gibson and Jeff Bezos (but definitely not to Donald Trump), the purpose and nature of comedy vis a vis the "cancel culture," the inspiration behind his trademark Pink Glasses (see excerpt below), and much, much more. *Playing with Myself* is an inspiring success story told with panache and humor that is equally brash and gentle - the ultimate beach read.

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how?

I was beyond amazed to learn that Randy Rainbow has honed his craft without the benefit of any formal instruction beyond high school - a Lincolnesque autodidact, which, in my view, qualifies him as a true genius (unlike the object of my favorite Rainbow song spoof, "A Very Stable Genius," of which I'm sure Gilbert and Sullivan would heartily approve). And my husband and I can certainly relate to the life-saving quality of the performing arts, as we were both *Continued on next page*

musical members of fractured families, and, like Randy's father, Rod's was a narcissistic Trump prototype. Theater and musical organizations have enriched our lives over the years; thus, Randy Rainbow's personal triumph as an artist certainly strikes a dulcet chord with us, so to speak.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? Aside from being flat-out funny, this book is a confidence builder for anyone with unrealized aspirations. I would only caution readers that the language is bawdy at times, with frequent (but not excessive, in my opinion) f-bombs, and thus is not recommended for persons who are linguistically conservative - i.e., averse to encountering profanity in literature. More liberal-minded readers can relax and soak in the healthy positivity as one would the Vitamin D and oxygen in the outdoor atmosphere.

How long might it take to read this book? Because *Playing with Myself* will prove to be an enjoyable, giggle-inducing reading experience and is devoid of any technical language (the author frankly admits to his deficiency in science and math), it will prove to be a quick read, and can be finished in a day.

In one of my earliest political spoofs ahead of the 2016 election (I don't recall specifically which video it was), I thought it might be mildly amusing if, while acting like Anderson Cooper and pretending to conduct a serious interview, I suddenly put on a pair of ridiculous, pink, rhinestone, cat-eye glasses I'd found buried in a bag of Halloween junk, the way journalists often do to show they mean business. I raised the glasses to my face as I spoke soberly and then stared through them with a deadpan expression at the interviewee (added later in editing) as he or she responded to my question. Just like that, a stare was born...

As far as I'm concerned, everyone has a pair of Pink Glasses tucked in their back pocket, whether they realize it or not. They're the key that unlocks all the joy, humor, creativity, and magic within you. They're a secret superpower that allows you to turn your biggest insecurities into your greatest assets. They're a sparkly, rose-colored lens through which you can see this crazy world however you want to see it. They're whatever gives you the courage to cut the s***, find your truth, and proudly put it out there on full display.

Consider this a personal prescription from your favorite fairy godoptometrist (that's me) to find your Pink Glasses, and wear them often.

HalloweeM FAQ: Chicago Area Mensa's RG

HalloweeM, Chicago Area Mensa's Regional Gathering (RG), is October 27-30, 2022, in Wheeling, IL at the Westin Chicago North Shore. This FAQ will answer some of your questions and hopefully encourage you to join us!

What's an RG? An RG (Regional Gathering) is a weekend long event (in WeeM's case, we add in an extra day and start Thursday). An RG is put on by a Local Group and draws attendees from all over the region (hence the name).

Where did the name WeeM come from? 46 years ago, a group of Mensans decided to have an RG in Chicago and to have it in the fall and since I've never known a Mensan who would pass up the chance to stick an "M" in someplace, it became HalloweeM, or more affectionately, WeeM.

What happens at an RG?

Like almost everything else in Mensa, you can pick and choose how much Halloween you "do" at WeeM.

What are RGs like? Every RG has its own flavor, but there are some things I've seen at every RG I've been to. Expect:

- Presentations and speakers on a wide range of topics. At WeeM, expect multiple tracks and wanting to be in several places at the same time.
- Food--snacks and beverages, and depending on the RG, some or all meals. At WeeM, Saturday dinner is on your own, but the rest of the meals are included.
- Games. WeeM has a 24-hour games room with Chicago's incredible selection of games
- Scheduled tournaments
- A constantly buzzing/chatting/hanging out Hospitality space.

How does WeeM differ from other events? WeeM is on a larger scale. Many RGs are 100-200 people. WeeM is over 500 and draws from all over the country—even some international attendees.

What about the kids? Babysitting is available (additional fee) for those with small children. We're working on some Kids Track activities.

What about the people? People are the most important part of WeeM. Expect to meet and greet--you will make new friends. Many of us see people we don't see very often and enjoy catching up. It's impossible to categorize the attendees; other than "human", there isn't a category that everyone fits in.

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What if I need some alone time? Sit down at an empty table in Hospitality and take out your phone or a book. Find the table with the coloring books. Of course, you can always slip off to your room to recharge. You won't be the only one who does so!

Is WeeM Halloween themed? Halloween isn't my favorite holiday. A few things are Halloween themed, but not the entire event. The table and area directions are Halloween themed. (They're fantastic but don't take any of them home--we reuse them.) The pun-tastic Friday night costume contest always happens. Being in the costume contest is lots of fun, but it's optional (although most people want to be in the audience even if they aren't part of the contest--but that's optional, too.).

Costume contest? The Friday night costume contest is a WeeM tradition. There's a kids' costume contest before the adult one. The kid one is, well, kid-friendly. The later one, no promises. There's room (and winners) for puns, traditional, and theme costumes. Attendees still talk about "My Big Geek Wedding", "One Night Stand", "Reading Rainbow", "Microwave Coven", "The Masked Debaters", and "Reptile Disfunction" (and its follow-on). Categories change from year to year. Last year there was a winner for best bribe to the judges. As always, the judges' decisions are arbitrary, capricious, and final.

HalloweeM is an amazing event--we hope you'll join us this year!

The regular monthly meeting of the Central Indiana Mensa ExCom was held virtually via Zoom on Tuesday, June 21, 2022.

LocSec Teresa Gregory called the meeting to order at 7:07 pm.

Members present: Teresa Fisher, Teresa Gregory, Ann Hake, Nan Harvey, Kurt Williams, Bob Zdanky, and Matthew Zwick.

Guests: Jon Applegate (Regional Ombudsman), Jan Pfeil Doyle, and Pat Milligan.

The committee reviewed the minutes of the May 2022 ExCom meeting. Kurt Williams moved that the minutes be accepted. Matthew Zwick seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

The committee reviewed the Treasurer's report for May 2022. Kurt Williams moved that the report be accepted. Ann Hake seconded the motion, and the motion was carried.

A membership report was compiled by Teresa Gregory based upon the information available as of 5/31/2022 from American Mensa: 447 members, 0 new, 3 movein, 3 rejoins, and 4 prospects. No candidates were tested.

Old Business

Monthly Gathering: Has resumed in person at All Souls; we will plan to meet in the Beattie Room, which worked out very well for our May meeting.

Other Gatherings: Mensans Dining Out and Ham 'n' Eggs are meeting in person, the Lunch Bunch is alternating meeting formats between virtual and in person, and the book group is meeting in hybrid format. Other opportunities for virtual meetings will also continue.

Outdoor Gathering (OG): Occurred May 20-22, 2022, at Versailles State Park. It was attended by approximately 20 people, who enjoyed the event despite the weather. A profit of \$186.70 was realized. It was noted that EventBrite charged \$6 per registration, accounting for approximately 10% of our registration fees; further investigation will be done to see if this is an increase from the past and whether EventBrite will continue to be a good registration vendor for our events. Reservations have been made and a deposit put down for next year's OG, which will take place at the same venue on the weekend of May 19-21, 2023.

CIM ExCom elections are due to be held this September. Karen Guse (chair), Karen Steilberger, and John Blankenship have agreed to serve on the Nominating Committee. Larry Marcus has agreed to chair the Election Committee. *Continued on next page*


