THIS MONTH: Outlive: The Science and Art of Longevity by Peter Attia with Bill Gifford

Outlive: The Science and Art of Longevity, by Peter Attia, MD, with Bill Gifford, 425 pages, published in 2023. To be discussed at the MBG meeting on Sunday, April 21st, 2024, at 2:00 PM. See Calendar or Meetup for more info. Peter Attia is a noted researcher on longevity. He decries the current consensus that focuses on quantity (long life) versus quality (good, enjoyable life). I know it's hard to think about death, but it would do you good to consider what kind of death you might want to have: long and lingering with increasing misery; or a long time feeling great followed by a fast decline? If you think maybe the latter is for you, the longest possible enjoyable life, perhaps this book is for you. Attia takes aim at the four big killers in those of advanced age: heart disease, cancer, Alzheimer's (or other mental degenerative condition), and diabetes, or general metabolic dysfunction. He decries current processes of not looking for early diagnoses, but making them when it's almost too late to do anything about the conditions. The treatments can be excruciating to the patient, and uses up

quality of life to prolong life that is usually in a state of misery. He reviews scientific discoveries of these diseases and their treatments, and presents findings and results fairly clearly and simply. He critiques the most common treatments for these killers and presents alternatives. He doesn't present by-the-numbers recipes to deal with these problems, but does a fairly good job describing the factors you need to consider in tailoring your personal approach. He has four specific areas of focus: nutrition, exercise, sleep, and mental health. If any of this sounds interesting to you, why don't you find a copy, go read it, and come via Zoom or in person to our Book Group meeting on April 21 st, 2024, at 2:00 PM? NEXT MONTH: The Coming Wave: Technology, Power, and the 21st Century's Greatest Dilemma, by Mustafa Suleyman

The Coming Wave: Technology, Power, and the 21st Century's Greatest Dilemma, by Mustafa Suleyman, 352 pp, published in September 2023, will be discussed at the Mensa Book Group meeting on Sunday, May 19th, at 2:00 PM. See the MIND Calendar/Events or Meetup for more information.

Mr. Suleyman is the co-founder and CEO of Inflection AI. Previously he co-founded DeepMind, which is now Google DeepMind. His book traces out the future of the world economy and world civilization for the rest of this century. The three pillars of the unparalleled innovation and change that he sees are AI, biotechnology, and practically unlimited sustainable energy. The dilemma he sees is whether we will allow AI to become as powerful as it can; the unease he feels is wondering whether we can limit AI at all. After all, both good and bad world actors are capable of grabbing AI and running with it; it therefore seems incumbent on the good guys to run with it as hard as they can.

DeepMind, by the way, is the AI that solved one of the gnarliest biology problems of the last 50 years: how do long chains of proteins fold themselves into 3D shapes? All the countless proteins in our bodies are in 3D, and up to recently we had no idea how they did it. DeepMind solved the problem so quickly, the community working this problem was gobsmacked, some saying, "I never dreamed this would be solved in my lifetime."

Suleyman begins by writing, "It's no exaggeration to say the entirety of the human world depends on either living systems or our intelligence. And yet both are now in an unprecedented moment of exponential innovation and upheaval, an unparalleled augmentation that will leave little unchanged."

Reading this book may be critical for our understanding of our near future. Please read it, and come to our meeting on May 19th at 2:00 to discuss it. We'd love to see you there.

Meet the New Boss, Different from the Old Boss

My term as Regional Vice Chair 4 (RVC4) ends in June, but I've been striving to avoid lame duck mode. I'm trying to keep up the energy I've shown all along by actively staying in contact with Local Group members and leadership – in person as much as possible.

I've also been corresponding with many members concerned about the proposed dues increase. By the time you read this article, it will have passed or not. While some dues increase is needed, I feel the jump to \$107 was too much and therefore voted against the motion. Hopefully you renewed your membership before March 31st to take advantage of the current pricing.

I've also been campaigning for the nationally elected Second Vice Chair Board of Directors (AMC) seat. That's kept me busy too, although in truth I've been at it for a year now. While reasonably well known in our Region – hopefully favorably – I now need to extend that recognition nationally. Since the beginning of last year, I've attended twelve RGs, our AG, and Mind Games®. Regardless of how the election plays out, we'll have mostly new faces on the AMC. Eight of the ten RVC positions will be filled by someone new; the remaining two are contested and may or may not be won by an incumbent. For the five nationally elected roles, three will be filled by current AMC members, although only one will retain her current job: Chair Lori Norris. The Treasurer and Second Vice Chair spots are contested by current AMC members and people who would be new to the AMC. If won by incumbents, both would be new to those roles. Out of fifteen total positions, we'll have somewhere between eight and twelve people new to the AMC.

Here in Region 4, Matt Crawford ran unopposed and was declared elected as RVC4. Starting mid-April, our members may vote in three contested races: Secretary, Treasurer, and Second Vice Chair – the job I'd like to have. Depending on how you have your preferences set, you'll be notified about how to vote by e-mail or snail mail.

Elections are of course important – even if we often see 90% or more of members not voting. By being among those who do, you'd be honoring the volunteers willing to donate their time and expertise to make Mensa better. Please review the campaign materials and vote for the best candidates! With so many new board members, it'll be important to have a good transition. We're already considering ways to on-board the new team. I've been compiling a "list of stuff you should probably know if you don't already" for Matt, and I'll foist it upon him at an opportune time. It's already five pages long. Sorry about that, Matt.

The Second Vice Chair is typically appointed as one of the American representatives on Mensa International's Board. I have served as International Strategy Chair. I've attended many international Mensa events. I've lived in Switzerland and Germany for a total of seven years as an adult. During a 35-year professional career, my responsibilities have spanned the globe.

Please take the time to carefully consider the candidates and honor the volunteers wanting to work for you by casting your vote starting mid-April. I'm hoping you'd agree I'd be a great Second Vice Chair. Please vote for Jon Gruebele, and thanks for your support!

Books On The Runway

Margy Fletcher

Author: Maggie Ryan Sandford

Title: Consider the Platypus: Evolution Through Biology's Most Baffling

Book Description: In 1789, Benjamin Franklin, in reference to the "permanency" of the new U. S. Constitution, remarked in a letter to Jean-Baptiste Le Roy that "nothing can be said to be certain except death and taxes." A more far-reaching inevitability can be added to this list: *change*. Feared at least subliminally by all, and reviled and mightily resisted particularly by the conservative-minded, *change* through *evolution*, asserts science journalist and

science education researcher Maggie Ryan Sanford, is a powerful adaptive tool worth celebrating, not denigrating. Indeed, evolution has wrought a delightfully diverse menagerie of creatures, the oddest of which are featured in Sandford's rollicking, humorous, and informative volume, *Consider the Platypus*.

The book's preface lays the groundwork for the author's exploration of evolution and its extraordinary effects on terrestrial life; definitions of the terms "evolution," "animal," and "theory;" a biographical sketch of Charles Darwin, and an explanation of the author's preference for representing our natural heritage as a River, not a Tree of Life (see excerpt below). The fifty unusual creatures profiled in the book are arranged in the following categories, laid out in the book's four parts:

- Part 1 Outside In: The mechanics of natural selection applicable to animal appearances (e.g., duck-billed platypus, blue whale, peppered moth).
- Part 2 Song of Myself: Genetic comparisons between humans and other animal species (e.g., fruit fly, zebra finch, house mouse, bonobo).
- Part 3 Hopeless Monsters: Bizarre, seemingly useless adaptations that ultimately generate more successful species (e.g., barn owl, aye-aye, velvet spider, little brown bat).
- Part 4 The Secret to Eternal Life: What enables long lifespans in certain creatures (e.g., axolotl, naked mole rat, honeybee, tardigrade). Sandford concludes her volume with the website name whereby the reader can access the 500 sources to which she referred in the process of researching and writing this book: ctheplatypus.com, and with some words to the wise: "Be skeptical. Stay curious."

Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how?

Like a (peppered) moth to the proverbial flame, I am eternally attracted to high-quality naturalist literature. Teeming with Rodica Prato's marvelous sketches and with historical artwork and photographs, *Consider the Platypus* certainly does not disappoint. Both thought-provoking and mirthful, this book is an effective antidote to my usual April preoccupation with death and taxes (my mother's passing on April Fool's Day in 2005, and, of course, the IRS...). It has motivated me to look out the window and absorb nature's spring bounty - the awe-inspiring products of the millennia-long and continuing process of evolution. Our planet is in a constant state of flux, as is evolutionary science as a discipline - thank the heavens!

Who should definitely read this book? Why? Consider the Platypus is formatted similarly to a textbook, each chapter devoted to a unique animal species and featuring a grouping of brief sidebars covering such topics as: the percentage of genomes shared with humans, the evolutionary timeline of the species, Charles Darwin's writings on the individual creature, the animal's physical and behavioral attributes, lessons learned from the study of this beast, and terms defined (examples thereof are mammal, gene glow, hybrid, convergent evolution, comparative anatomy, genetics, genome, transposons,

coevolution). Fortunately, this theoretical primer provides an infinitely more enjoyable reading experience than the average school textbook offers. The clever and colorful writing style should appeal to all readers, high school level and above, with a background or interest in the life sciences. Unlike Darwin's four-year circumnavigation of the planet, this educational journey is truly the destination. Aye-aye, mates!

How long might it take to read this book? This mid-length, eminently fascinating book should be easy to read and difficult to put down; thus, the 263 pages of text can be perused in 3 to 5 days.

Give a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or inspiring quote:

Naturalists before Darwin and many more after him have tried to reimagine the tree of life..., that allowed the tree to spiral in on itself so as to accommodate all the information springing from it... [T]he explosion of genomic science has begun to work with the image of a web of life, presenting connections between species that haven't shared an ancestor for millennia...

For this book, consider a river.

Like a tree, a river branches, but its path is determined only by its environment and the laws of physics (such as gravity, friction, and motion). It does not have a predetermined shape; it doesn't have a driving "life" force. It simply runs toward the ocean, diverted by rocks, hills, valleys, and weather. Over time and space, some rivulets dry into gas and reenter the water cycle (like animals dying off, ending lineages and returning organic molecules to the environment), while other rivulets might split, shrink, or grow.

The river has volume,too; three dimensions rather than single points linked by lines. When we talk about "an animal" here we're not (usually) talking about a single animal from which all others spring. We're not even talking about two animals and their lineage, like the "begats" on a human family tree. We're talking about groups of animals, populations over time, that bred and changed en masse, branched and met back up, grew and shrank, left a few fossils behind and brought traces of all of those changes with them.

To promote attendance to the 2024 AG, this is the fourth talk in the series addressing Kansas City's unique attractions.

The title of the April Theodore Talk is, "Why Black Baseball Matters". This virtual event will take place on Zoom April 28 at 2:30 p.m. Central Time (3:30 Eastern, 12:30 Pacific). It is free to all members

In 1920 Andrew "Rube" Foster established the Negro National League in Kansas City, Missouri. Featuring teams in Chicago, Cincinnati, Dayton, Detroit, Indianapolis, Kansas City and St. Louis, the NNL adopted the slogan, "We Are the Ship, All Else the Sea" as a pledge to set its own course. Many teams discovered financial success coming out of the gate; Foster's American Giants drew nearly 200,000 spectators during the 1921 season.

The NNL created a forum where many star players could make a name for themselves – especially to white audiences. Future Hall of Famers Cool Papa Bell, Martín Dihigo, Willie Foster, Judy Johnson, Satchel Paige and Turkey Stearnes all flourished in the NNL. The Negro Leagues proved that Black players could play on even terms with their white counterparts – and draw just as much interest from baseball fans.

Larry Lester, co-founder of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum, will discuss how these men of color changed the landscape of American history. Placing their achievements against the background of discrimination and political resistance enhances baseball history's efforts toward social change.
