#### THIS MONTH: *American Midnight: The Great War, A Violent Peace, and Democracy's Forgotten Crisis*, by Adam Hochschild

*American Midnight,* by Adam Hochschild, 321 pp, published in 2022, will be discussed at the Mensa Book Group meeting on Sunday, May 18, at 2:00 PM. See the MIND Calendar and Events for more details.

Woodrow Wilson became President after stints as president of Princeton University and then Governor of New Jersey. He'd campaigned in his second term to keep the US out of the Great War, but changed his mind and asked Congress for a war declaration in April, 1917. By then, the American appetite for war was huge. Another factor in the coming turn of events was a robust left wing in American politics and labor. A moderately strong Labor Party had a few members in Congress. Eugene V. Debs, its leader, was a national figure. Labor unions, including the International Workers of the World, had a presence and a tendency to characterize the conflict as a "rich man's war." Anarchists were few but active and violent; calling them "bomb throwers" was apt. What followed the American entry into the war was a level of government oppression and suppression of antiwar sentiment that even today seems astonishing. Ethnic Germans and the German language were vilified. Socialists and labor leaders were jailed--Debs ran for President from a prison cell. Immigrants were rounded up and exported. The war ended in 1918, but the repression continued until the next election, whose winner ran on the slogan "return to normalcy." Warren G. Harding has a bad reputation today, but he did throttle the police state tendencies.

This book addresses a fascinating yet little-known part of recent American history. Its lessons can be cautionary, alarming, and yet reassuring: we got through that, so...

*Fever In the Heartland*, by Timothy Egan, 354 pp (text), published in 2023, is the topic for discussion at the Mensa Book Group meeting on Sunday, May 18<sup>th</sup>, 2025, at 2:00 PM. Indiana is the not-so-proud place where the 20<sup>th</sup> Century's version of the Ku Klux Klan had its strongest, widest growth and power; and where it met its most crushing defeat. Expert opinion states that radical movements expand until their excesses disgust and repel the overwhelming majority of their supporters. This is certainly the case for the Indiana Klan, which at its apex counted the governor, most of the state legislature, and many of its federal representatives and senators as members; also countless civic and county officials and police. I will not mention the particular excess that led to the fall of the Klan, but it was horrendous. All the same, it took a handful of courageous Hoosiers to see justice done. The author eloquently describes the rise, plateau, and overthrow of this group.

It's a gripping read. If you try it and agree or disagree, we'd love to see you on Sunday, May 18<sup>th</sup>, at 2:00 PM and discuss it. Please give it a try!

You've probably heard a lot about the Annual Gathering (AG) coming up in Chicago July 2<sup>nd</sup>-6<sup>th</sup>. The AG has been on the back cover of the Bulletin every month and there are regular posts on Mensa's social media.

#### Escaping the Nazis--The Untold Story of the Kindertransport

From Someone Who Was on the Train Moderated by Benyamin Cohen

The Nazi government started its program of ethnic cleansing in 1933. In the months prior to the start of WWII, 10,000 children left their parents and escaped the Nazis on the Kindertransport, a series of train rides to safe havens in Europe where good Samaritans took them in. Those that still live are at least in their 90's, our speaker, Josef Eisinger, just celebrated his 101st birthday! He was 15 years old when he left Vienna on a Kindertransport.

The ability to hear from someone who actually rode on the train is fast disappearing. This presentation may be the last opportunity to share this experience.

The presentation will include the grandson of another Kindertransport survivor, in a conversation moderated by journalist Benyamin Cohen.

**Journalist Benyamin Cohen** is the news director of *Forward*, America's oldest Jewish newspaper. His first book was called "*My Jesus Year: A Rabbi's Son Wanders the Bible Belt in Search of His Own Faith*," a memoir about Benyamin spending 52 weeks going to 52 different churches – and how the experience made him a better Jew.

For writing it, he received the Georgia Author of the Year award, and it was named one of the best books of the year by *Publishers* 

Benyamin has a bizarre side job Managing the official social media accounts of Albert Einstein, where he posts every day to the 20 million fans who follow the world's favorite genius across Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. He is the author of "*The Einstein Effect: How the World's Favorite Genius Got into Our Cars, Our Bathrooms, and Our Minds.*"

He is based in Morgantown, WV, where he lives with his wife, three dogs, a cat, and a flock of chickens known as the Co-Hens.

Jacob Schulz, blues musician and historian, will discuss the current challenges facing the blues, including its fading mainstream presence and efforts to preserve its legacy for future generations. This talk will not only highlight the deep historical roots of the blues but also showcase how it continues to resonate as a timeless and influential art form today.

#### **Books On The Runway**

Margy Lancet Fletcher

Author: Joe Shute

Title: Stowaway: The Disreputable Exploits of the Rat Publisher: Bloomsbury Publishing Plc (U.K.) Year: 2024

Has Been Read by: Margy Lancet Fletcher

Book Description: In Vanishing Treasures, Katherine Rundell argues that the most tragic aspect of our interaction with Earth's other inhabitants is that we only hurt the ones we love. Ironically, according to British journalist Joe Shute, the mammalian species most reviled by the human race has survived - and thrived - despite our appetite for destruction (the Mills Brothers' wistful tones versus the aggressive blasts of Guns N' Roses, for pop music fans). Rats! Exactly. *Stowaway*, Shute's energetic and thoughtful treatise/memoir/travelog promotes a thorough understanding of the much-maligned rodent. To accomplish this feat, the author immerses himself in the lives of rats, seeking out their various habitats, and in the process provides the reader with copious data on the evolutionary and cultural history, physical attributes, and modern behaviors and distribution of rats. He even shares his experiences as (gasp!) a pet rat owner (thus demonstrating true commitment to his subject). Joe Shute's fascinating literary journey transports the reader to such locations as the German town of Hamelin (home of the Pied Piper legend); his home city of Sheffield, where he tunnels into - ahem - the underbelly of urban civilization; the Paris Museum of Natural History, a renowned rat research site; Tanzania, where scientists perfect training programs for rescue operations and farmers strive to eliminate disease-spreading and crop-ravaging rats; the Canadian

province of Alberta, which proudly boasts the complete absence of rats; and Inchcolm Island in the Firth of Forth, one of the last strongholds of the black rat. Finally, he describes his own battle with predatory rats invading his chicken coops, and discusses ecological methods of managing the rat population. *Has this book changed the way you think, your attitude toward life, or even your life itself? If so, how?* 

Although I have never been up close and personal with a rat (and never wish to), this animal does appeal to my artistic nature simply because the rat's reputedly malicious nature lends itself to compelling characterizations in books and movies, solid examples of which are the Pixar film *Ratatouille*, Robert C. O'Brien's *Mrs Frisby and the Rats of Nimh*, George Orwell's *1984*, and two American classics not included in Shute's Brit-based narrative: E. B. White's *Charlotte's Web* and Donald Harington's *The Cockroaches of Stay More*, both of whose rats prove to be more heroic than villainous. I am also encouraged by Shute's accounts of the use of the hypersensitive abilities of rats to search for missing persons, detect human diseases, and locate land mines.

Who should definitely read this book? Why? This "intelligent and enlightening book" (per English author Sir Michael Morpurgo) should attract experts and dabblers in a wide variety of scientific and artistic disciplines. Depending on the reader's personal belief system, the underlying message that every creature on Earth adds value to the ecosystem can be construed as a defense of either the notion of intelligent design or the theory of evolution as an effective agent of change (perhaps both).

*How long might it take to read this book?* At a relatively modest text length of 255 pages, this volume can be nibbled in less than a week, or gobbled in just 2 to 3 days, depending on the reader's pace and "rest and relaxation" schedule. *Provide a short characteristic section, an awesome sentence, or an inspiring quote:* 

Rats represent the worst of us, or at least that is what we tell ourselves. They are rapacious, over-sexed, destructive, pestilent - hideous enough to justify spreading poison around our streets and homes and releasing a pair of hounds down an alley in pursuit of blood. We are obsessed as a society with the notion of rats mustering in the gloom and waiting to invade our lives. Newspapers are sporadically filled with stories of super-rats growing immune to poison and ever more bloated on our waste. I know, because as a journalist I have written some of these stories myself...

Despite our best efforts to tarnish their reputation it is, of course, humans who are far more culpable for the rapid destruction of the earth. Rats, like many animals we brand as 'vermin,' thrive as a direct result of the way we live and interact with the land, a mirror reflecting back to us our worst excesses.
